Presenters

Jamal Cunningham, Psy.D.

Dr. Jamal Cunningham is a licensed clinical psychologist who has 15 years of experience working with children and adolescents as an educator and mental health provider. He earned a Master of Education degree in school counseling from Bowie State University. Wanting to do more clinical work with youth, Dr. Cunningham attended Adler University (formerly known as Adler School of Professional Psychology) in Chicago, where he earned a Doctor of Psychology in Clinical Psychology degree with an emphasis in child and adolescent psychology. During this time, Dr. Cunningham completed a comprehensive training in providing identity affirming therapeutic services to LGBTQ youth and adults at Chicago's LGBTQ Mental Health Training Consortium. Currently, Dr. Cunningham is an assistant professor and core faculty member at the Wisconsin School of Professional Psychology. He also serves as a staff psychologist at New Insights, LLC where he provides psychotherapeutic and psychological assessment services to children, adolescents, and their families. Dr. Cunningham is member of the Wisconsin Psychological Association's Public Education Committee, through which he provides free psycho-educational opportunities to the public. And soon, he will be working as a consulting psychologist for the Milwaukee Wraparound program's care coordinators.

Keyona Walker, Ph.D.

Dr. Keyona Walker received a bachelor's degree in Psychology and Hispanic Studies from Illinois Wesleyan University in Bloomington, Illinois. As an undergraduate, she studied abroad at the Universidad de Granada in Spain. Upon completion of her undergraduate training, Dr. Walker entered the Counseling Psychology Doctoral Program at Marquette University. She obtained her master's degree in Counseling from Marquette University in 2008, and her doctoral degree in Counseling Psychology in 2011. Dr. Walker has experience working in community mental health, hospital, and correctional settings. She has provided individual and group therapy in both English and Spanish. Dr. Walker currently practices as a licensed psychologist in a hospital setting. She is also an Assistant Professor at Wisconsin School of Professional Psychology. Dr. Walker has a passion for working with people from marginalized groups and has facilitated diversity trainings throughout the state of Wisconsin.
