



New Year Around the World—Japan

People in Japan kick off the New Year by eating a warm bowl of soba noodles. The <u>tradition</u> dates back to the Kamakura period and is tied to a Buddhist temple giving out the noodles to the poor. Because the long thin noodles are firm yet easy to bite, it is believed eating them symbolizes a literal break away from the old year.

Other New Year's traditions have a wholesome focus. *Shōgatsu* (New Year) is usually celebrated with a visit to the local temple to exchange last year's lucky charms (*omamori*) for new ones. Afterward, people will feast on traditional New Year's foods, such as prawns (believed to bring a long life) and herring roe (to boost fertility).

January 25th January—Wolf Moon

It's thought that January's moon was named the Wolf Moon as it was common to hear wolves howling at this time of year in some countries. It was believed that, in January, wolves howled because they were hungry and it was harder for them to hunt in winter. Now, it's known that wolves howl for a far wider variety of reasons.

It is thought that a wolf moon offers us greater opportunity for deep self-reflection.

Capricorn—December 22nd—January 19th

(from Latin: "Goat-Horned") in astrology, the 10th sign of the zodiac, considered as governing the period from about December 22 to about January 19. One explanation of the fishtail with which the goat is often represented is found in the Greek myth of Pan, who, to avoid the monster Typhon, jumped into the water just as he was changing into animal shape. The half above water assumed the shape of a goat while the lower half, the tail, assumed the shape of a fish.

In astronomy, Capricornus is a zodiacal constellation lying in the southern sky between Aquarius and Sagittarius, at about 21 hours right ascension and 20° south declination. Its stars are faint; Deneb Algedi (Arabic for "kid's tail") is the brightest star, with a magnitude of 2.9. Capricornus usually refers to the constellation, and Capricorn usually refers to the astrological sign.

The Night Sky—Where is Capricorn?



Capricornus can be seen in the UK southern sky throughout the summer months. It looks very much like a squashed-looking triangle. Some charts depict it as two triangles arranged along a long line. It lies along the ecliptic, which is the path the Sun appears to take across the sky throughout the year. The Moon and planets also appear to move roughly along the ecliptic.

The Most Costly Phising Attacks to Date

Facebook and Google

Between 2013 and 2015, <u>Facebook and Google were tricked out of \$100</u> <u>million</u> due to an extended phishing campaign. The phisher took advantage of the fact that both companies used Quanta, a Taiwan-based company, as a vendor. The attacker sent a series of fake invoices to the company that impersonated Quanta, which both Facebook and Google paid. Eventually, the scam was discovered, and Facebook and Google took action through the US legal system. The attacker was arrested and extradited from Lithuania, and, as a result of the legal proceedings, Facebook and Google were able to recover \$49.7 million of the \$100 million stolen from them.

Crelan Bank

Crelan Bank, in Belgium, was the victim of a business email compromise (BEC) scam that cost the company approximately \$75.8 million. This type of attack involves the phisher compromising the account of a high-level executive within a company and instructing their employees to transfer money to an account controlled by the attacker. The Crelan Bank phishing attack was discovered during an internal audit, and the organization was able to absorb the loss since it had sufficient internal reserves.

What is Phishing?

Phishing is a prevalent type of social engineering that aims to steal data from the message receiver. Typically, this data includes personal information, usernames and passwords, and/or financial information. Phishing is consistently named as one of the top 5 types of cybersecurity attacks.



Bloody Mary

I'm a bit worried this won't make the 1st of Jan, which is National Bloody Mary Day, so here's hoping!

Why is a Bloody Mary called a Bloody Mary?

Some stories suggest that the Bloody Mary was named after a server named Mary who worked at a saloon bar called The Bucket Of Blood in Chicago. Others claim it was named after Queen Mary Tudor of England. No one knows for sure.

Ingredients large handful of ice 100ml vodka 500ml tomato juice 1 tbsp lemon juice, plus 2 slices to serve few shakes Worcestershire sauce few shakes Tabasco (smoked Tabasco is nice) pinch celery salt pinch black pepper



Method

STEP 1

Place the ice in a large jug. Measure the vodka, tomato juice and lemon juice and pour it straight onto the ice.

STEP 2

Add 3 shakes of Worcestershire sauce and Tabasco (or more if you like it very spicy) and a pinch of celery salt and pepper. Stir until the outside of the jug feels cold, then strain the cocktail into 2 tall glasses.

STEP 3

Top up with fresh ice, add a celery stick and lemon slice to both glasses and enjoy.

The Real Bloody Mary—Mary 1

Before Mary I, there had been other English queens who were the wives of the ruling king. However, Mary was the first 'Queen Regnant' - a queen who rules a country as the primary monarch rather than simply as a consort.

Mary was not only born at Greenwich Palace, but was also baptized there, in the Franciscan Observant Friars church (at the west end of the palace). Her parents, <u>Henry VIII</u> and <u>Catherine of Aragon</u>, had married there seven years earlier.



Was Mary I really known as 'Bloody Mary'?

Following the death of Edward VI, there was a bid to place his Protestant cousin Lady Jane Grey on the throne of England. However, nine days after Jane's accession, Mary gathered enough support to ride to London and claim the throne. Jane and her husband Lord Dudley were both executed.

Mary was crowned on 1 October 1553, and quickly set about attempting to restore the Roman Catholic faith in England. One of her first acts was to marry Prince Philip of Spain (the future Philip II) in 1554. She pushed the marriage through a resistant parliament, as she was desperate to conceive a Catholic heir. Philip was given the title of 'King of England' and the pair effectively ruled together.

This was an unpopular move, but an uprising against Mary's rule in 1554 - known as the 'Wyatt Rebellion' - was quickly quashed. Mary's half-sister was subsequently imprisoned in the Tower of London for several months, but no conclusive evidence that she had been involved in the plot was found.

During Mary's five-year reign, around 280 Protestants were burned at the stake for refusing to convert to Catholicism, and a further 800 fled the country. This religious persecution earned her the notorious nickname 'Bloody Mary' among subsequent generations. Her legacy was further tainted by the loss of Calais - England's last lands in Europe - to the French during her reign.

Mary's reputation has become defined by her religious persecutions, yet this is partly as a result of later Tudor propaganda.

Although Mary thought herself pregnant on two occasions, both proved to be false alarms. As a result, she never conceived a Catholic heir, and the Crown eventually passed to her Protestant half-sister Elizabeth following her death in 1558.

Burns Night—25th January

Burns Night itself marks the anniversary of Robert Burns' birth on 25 January 1759 and the traditional Burns supper is an evening event that celebrates his life and work. History can trace its origins back to nine of Burns' close friends who decided to get together to mark the fifth anniversary of their friend's death.


