9/11 and the Transformation of Memory

My legs were tired, my eyes heavy, and I shifted my weight from one leg to the next. Every four or five sways I'd fall completely to the side, hand grasping my mother's, causing her to tilt slightly as she pulled me back upright. I was six years old, and out of patience. "Mom, can we go? Mom. Mooooommmmm." Then the terse response, "Shush, I'm still talking. Quit pulling on me." They weren't even talking about anything interesting. They were saying things like "grassy knoll", and "Jackie-O", and "where were you when it happened?" and "I was in school, my teacher was crying". Booring. Who cares where you were, when it didn't effect you at all?

As an adult, I've been there. Restless child(ren) pulling on me and everything. Never in my wildest kid dreams did I imagine simple conversation to be enjoyable. Yet when I see friends, my desire no longer reaches out for a multi-player battle on Mario Kart, but a comfortable chair and stories about our lives and families. Imagine my surprise when I realized mid-conversation that I was mimicking the conversation I was trying to pull my mother away from so many years ago—only this time it wasn't about JFK's assassination, but a sunny Tuesday morning in 2001. Everyone took turns explaining their day, solemnly waiting for their turn, heads shaking in disgust. Muted patriotism welling tears in the corners of eyes. It did not effect me directly in any way, yet I care a great deal about where I was when the World Trade Center went down. Why? Because the memory transforms the way I look at the world.

Every generation has its tragic day in their formative years. In every case, global news is located within the individual's experience with it, down to the minutest detail: "I was stuck at a train crossing at the corner of 1st and Main when they came on the radio. It was a freight train. There were 94 cars. Ironically, the song they interrupted was 'Crash Into Me' by Dave Matthews Band." Why do we do this? Why insert ourselves into a tragedy with such detail and remembrance?

I think it's because a national tragedy shapes the way we look at the world, especially if the tragedy occurs during our formative years. Before Pearl Harbor, most Americans were content in their isolationism. But suddenly, the Day That Lives In Infamy meant our brothers and fathers had to suit up and march into the gaps of hell to save the world. Nothing was ever the same again. Once upon a time, presidential assassinations were the stories of uncivilized eras—

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raging liberal actors shouting “Sic semper tyrannis” and swinging from balconies like the Phantom of the Opera. But then JFK rode through Dallas, and the following decade proved that society was anything but stable and civilized. Nothing was ever the same again.

Eighteen years ago, I sat in A.P. English class, day-dreaming about the upcoming Homecoming dance and blissfully ignorant of Al-Qaeda. Then with a knock on the door, the classroom TV turned on, billowing black smoke before a live shot of The Second Plane, and nothing would ever be the same again. I went from cocky adolescent to insecure adult in about 45 minutes.



Our memories have this amazing capability to transform and shape our lives. If you think about it, without our memories we cannot have transformed lives. Often subconsciously, you rely on your memory to keep you safe, to guide your direction, to advance your success. The results can be good or bad: when was the last time you were curious enough to slap your hand on a hot stovetop? Memory serves. Do you still need a GPS when you drive to work every morning? Memory serves. How should you present yourself, dress yourself, act around your boss, in order to go home and get that “Ahhhhh” feeling of a good day’s work? Memory serves. Our own details somehow contribute to the story as a whole, and remembering these stories reaffirms and explains our place in the world.

The importance of memory for transforming and shaping lives is precisely why God continually and repeatedly reminds His people of what He has done, and exhorts them to remind each other. “This day shall be for you a memorial day.” “Remember this day in which you came out from Egypt.” “Why do you seek the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen ... and they remembered his words.” The memories serve to confirm again and again the goodness of God and His continued provision for His people. Even if we ourselves were not there, the memories connect us to it—they put us there; they transform the way we look at the world.

Take the Sacramental phrase at the end of the Words of Institution: “Do this in remembrance of me” does not make the body and blood of Christ into a mere memorial service, as if the people eating and drinking have no real connection to it. On the contrary, the remembrance of the Sacrament is a conscious consideration that this body, this blood, is for me. I am not just a bystander in this covenant of grace. I am not just a cog in the wheels of a Christian organization. I am a baptized, redeemed, called-by-name brother/sister of Jesus Christ, an heir according to the promise.

I was 6 weeks old when I was baptized, so obviously I don’t remember it. But when I cross myself, I can feel the water and hear the words as if it’s the sharpest memory in my head. I tell the story of my own baptism in a way that transforms my life into the grander story of salvation. I’m standing there at the foot of the cross. I’m weeping with Mary in the garden. I’m shouting, “My Lord and my God!” with Thomas. I know I was not actually there. But Jesus found me, saved me, installed these memories in me; when I tell the stories of my life they are a part of me, and I of them.

The rally cry of 9/11 was “Never Forget!” Amen to that.

2019 LCMS National Youth Gathering—Minneapolis MN—July 11-15



On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther nailed 95 theses on the door of a church to open conversation on issues in the Church, of which one was the practice of indulgences to raise funds for the church in stark contrast to the doctrine of God's gift of grace. After much turmoil and even war, Emperor Charles V recognized Lutheranism at the Diet of Augsburg in 1555.

This occurred around the same time as use of the printing press was becoming prevalent, allowing people to read information and communicate it more accurately. In 1518, 150 books were printed in Germany; six years later, 1,000! This opened up the world of theology to common people, even women – who could read information, though were still restricted from meetings and debate. What an amazing rebirth of community and faith! For this month, in the Michigan District LWML we recognize a grant which strives to revitalize Michigan – originally Detroit, and expanding to Pontiac, Flint, and Benton Harbor. Several hundred children attend the summer sports camp / VBS that has been offered for several years, and members work on Neighborhood Beautification programs and Employability Readiness. The Neighborhood Beautification works to combat part of the 70,000 vacant buildings, 31,000 empty houses, and

90,000 empty lots in Detroit. These also have the highest unemployment rates. Please pray for these powerful ministries when providing mites this month!

Prayer: Dear Lord, so many communities have challenges. Help us remember that these challenges are opportunities to work in the mission field. Bless our efforts to support these opportunities. In Jesus name, Amen.

After So Many Years Not Much Has Changed

It is dismaying that after years of sacrificing so much throughout Iraq and Syria not that much in terms of news has truly seemed to change. War and strife continue, kidnappings, bombing, senseless death do also. Displaced people want to return to their neighborhoods, homes, and businesses but are not at all secure in doing so. News of these troubles comes from Open Doors USA in their Prayer Force newsletter for September 2019 and it isn't very encouraging.

In Syria a lady named Randa lost her husband, a son and her home during the war. She's wanting to return to her home village after being displaced twice but hasn't been able to. Sadly, she's not alone as refugees are still wondering and wandering. Continue to pray for those who want to return 'home.'

Another report tells that those kidnapped during the war by rebels and ISIS are still missing. There are two bishops from Aleppo who were abducted in April of 2013 and are still missing. I am awaiting news regarding one of the Bishops from Aleppo whom I wrote about 3 years ago, Antonio Audo. After this long period, it's difficult to know if they are still alive or where they might be. Yet, their churches in Aleppo ask for prayers that

they will return. Anything's possible in Christ and we wait in hope.

ISIS " sleeper cells" are known to exist in Mosul, Iraq. This makes Christians hesitant about returning home. Please pray that peace will prevail and that our mighty God will touch the hearts of those opposed to Christianity in Iraq.

Pray also for those returning to the Ninevah Plain who are struggling to resettle in safety. Finding work, restoring homes and businesses has been extremely difficult. Pray for these anxious people also.

When this Mideastern conflict began I felt that it was going to become a generational war. Sadly, it seems that it just might happen. Remember, "If you are not in the house of Islam, you are in the house of war. If you are in the house of war, we must destroy you." (From the Koran or Hadith.) Remember also, "...for He who is in you is greater than he who is in

the world." 1 John 4:4. (Liberties were taken in using the upper-case H in He. That is how I learned it as a child.)

May we be found worthy of the name we bear in Christ.

Several years ago, I devoted an article to the work and struggles of Bishop Antoine Audo. I was wondering how he is doing, if he's still serving and even, still alive. Rumors persist the two may remain alive, but also that seems unlikely (though their bodies have not been discovered or returned). I do not have recent information on their cases. Hope that's helpful. Council Meeting Minutes of August 8, 2019**

(APPROVED)

Chairman Ben Helmreich called the meeting to order at 6:33 p.m. Pastor Matyas opened the meeting with a prayer.

Council members in attendance include: Ben Helmreich, Jeremy Warren, Jean Begick, Rachel Appold, Virginia Hutter, Lynn Hendrick, Weston Appold, Scott Weiss, Jack Lustila, John Schlicker, and Pastor Matyas.

Minutes-*A motion passed* to approve the minutes from the June 13, 2019 Council meeting as corrected.

Treasurer's Report-Lynn Hendrick, Board of Business Chair, presented the Treasurer's Report on behalf of Andy Wiess. July ended with a net loss of approximately \$9,000. A loss of \$400 was budgeted. YTD we have a deficit of \$57,453.66. A loss of \$63,545 was budgeted. The Ministry Center presently has a deficit of \$205,899. The Treasurer's Report will be filed for audit.

Committee Reports

Ministry Center Building Committee-Sam Britton will be presenting an update on the Ministry Center at Sunday's Voters Meeting.

Planning Committee-Sam will also be presenting an update on the plans for the School Parking Lot renovation.

Gifts and Memorials-John Schlicker shared with Council the draft of the Gifts and Memorials Handbook, including an application for funding. The balance in the Fund is approximately \$100,000.

BOARD REPORTS

Board of Elders-Chairman Jeremy Warren presented the Board of Elders Report.

 - i. Xander Diaz to St. Paul, Lakeland, Florida.

A motion passed approving the membership changes.

Board of Trustees-Chairman Weston Appold updated Council on the following Trustee business:

1. Church and School carpets have been cleaned this summer.

2. Two fan motors were replaced.
3. The School's hot water heater needed repair.
4. The freezer room will be cleaned up and a new ice maker will be installed.
5. Weston will be following up with Dan Wills regarding the painting of the highway sign.

Board of Education-Rachel Appold, Board of Education Chair, shared the following school news:

1. Accreditation is May 2020. The Preschool is also included this year. The various teams have been working hard all summer in preparation.
2. The PTO is gearing up for another school year. They have some great things planned for this year.
3. The back to school picnic is being retooled into a "Family Funday" for all church and school members following the JME Walk on Saturday, September 14th.

Board of Business Management-Lynn updated Council on the following:

1. The Board did not meet in July.
2. The health insurance policy for the staff was up for renewal. The Board received a few proposals, and after review, they have chosen the Blue Care Network Platinum HMO plan. Insurance costs will only be going up 2% instead of the 9% increase they would have had with their current plan.
3. The Board will be working on a volunteer policy.

Board of Youth-Chair Scott Weiss shared the following:

1. The Board did not meet in July.
2. The National Youth Gathering was a success. 21,000 youth and chaperones were in attendance. St. Paul had 10 youth and 3 adults travel to the gathering.

Board of Stewardship-Chair Virginia Hutter requested some information from Ben and John regarding nominations. She intends to incorporate these volunteer opportunities into the Stewardship blurbs in September's bulletins.

New Business-None

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 7:21 p.m. and closed with a prayer led by Ben.
