

- Foundation Degree
- Higher National Diploma / Certificate HND/HNC
 Study costs similar to University

Foundation Degree can be studied at College* or University HND/HNC studied at College.

Degree – can be PART TIME or DISTANCE LEARNING (Open University) *Colleges offer degrees





What you can study will depend on what you achieve now.





Foundation degree

- Usually one, sometimes two years
- Provides a further chance to study
- Foundation degrees can be a stepping stone for transfer onto a full degree programme
- Entry requirements (UCAS points) for foundation degrees are (often) lower than for a full degree

Apprenticeships

An Apprenticeship is a real job with training which would allow you to earn while you learn, whilst gaining a nationally recognised qualification.

Apprenticeships take between one and five years to complete and cover 1500 job roles in a wide range of industries, from engineering to accountancy, public relations to veterinary nursing.

Apprenticeships are now available up to degree level and beyond.







How can I afford it??

- Tuition fees are covered by the Student Loans Company interest rates are based on income once a student has graduated
- Maintenance loans up to £8,430 per year help to cover living costs
- Additional financial support available for students with disabilities, from low income backgrounds, or who are studying specific courses (medicine, social work etc.)
- Loans are not repayable until a student has finished their course and is earning over £25,000 per year. Any remaining debts are written off after 30 years
- Universities offer a wide variety of scholarships to support students (at Newcastle: opportunity scholarships, subject scholarships, sport scholarships). Further details can be accessed on specific university websites, or on open days
- Part time courses, shortened courses, and apprenticeship schemes can also help reduce costs





Widening participation and employment

Figures from 2015–16 show that more than 90% of graduates were in work or further study within six months of leaving university.

•In 2016, working age (aged 16 to 64) graduates earned on average £9,500 more than non-graduates.

In 2017, 20.4% of 18-year-old English-domiciled young people from low participation neighbourhoods entered higher education, compared to 11.2% in 2006.

- •In 2017, English pupils receiving free school meals were 87% more likely to go to university than they were in 2006.
- •The number of full-time undergraduates from black and minority ethnic groups rose by 38% between 2007–08 and 2015–16.

Home vs Away

Castle Leazes – Catered

- Catered
- •Breakfast and evening meals provided Monday Friday
- •Live on corridors of between 10 15 people
- •Share a kitchen, toilets and showers
- •First year students only
- •Close to Uni: 20 min walk to campus
- •Cleaner provided for communal areas only
- •Rent from £167.09
- •Facilities Include: shop, bars, computer clusters, laundrette, games rooms, TV rooms, bicycle storage, limited car parking
- Local transport links: Bus station 1 mile,
 Train station 1.5 miles, A1 3 miles, Airport 6 miles

Home

- •Stay in your family home with parents/carers, siblings, dog, cat, parrot...
- •Away from other first year students
- •Rent £30 per week or less, or even none at all! (usually includes food, washing etc)
- •Travelling time to Uni, depends on how far away you live – could be up to an hour or more
- •Range of facilities: sofa, non school-like toilets, TV
- •Transport links need to consider bus fares, train tickets, petrol costs

Park Terrace – Self Catered

- Share a flat with 7/8 other people
- No meals provided
- •Share a kitchen, communal area and bathroom within the flat
- •First year students only
- •Close to Uni: 10 min walk to campus
- •Cleaner provided for communal areas only
- •Rent from £129.78 per week
- •Facilities include: microwave, ironing facilities, cutlery, vacuum, kettle, toaster, fridge, freezer
- •Local transport links: Bus station − 1 mile, Train station − 1.5 miles, A1 − 3 miles, Airport − 6 miles



The PARTNERS programme: Our

supported entry route





- Receive a two grade point lowered offer for chosen course (e.g. from AAB to BBB)
- Applicants need to:
 - Meet one of our eligibility criteria
 - Attend and complete the PARTNERS
 Academic Summer School (all expenses paid)
- Careers and study support offered during degree

TRUE, BUT... All students are able to access loans, which are paid back gradually over the course of their career. There are also ways of studying and bursaries that can help reduce the financial burden

MYTH. If a student doesn't make direct use of their subject in their future career, they will certainly make use of the transferable skills they have developed

MYTH. There are thousands of academic and vocational courses across the country, which cater for and support students from all backgrounds

TRUE. However, a degree is often essential for certain occupations, and will help boost your employment prospects








