


Recognising this, FORM has instituted a Creative Learning program, developed in partnership with the Paul Collard, CEO of Culture and Creativity in Education, and a globally respected expert in how children learn.

### FORM's Creative Learning program:

# The Creative Schools initiative is first of its kind in Australia.

Developed with Paul Collard as part of FORM's Creative Learning program, Creative Schools' purpose is to enhance outcomes for young Western Australians by activating creative learning strategies through the establishment of meaningful partnerships between teachers, creative (arts) practitioners and young people.

Creative Schools builds on robust international evidence that engagement with the arts improves the quality and impact of general education. Using arts as a pedagogical tool for learning cultivates a unique set of academic, social and personal skills.

The defining characteristic of the program is the collaborative partnerships between artists, classroom staff and learners, and the ways in which these partnerships helps to bring the curriculum to life. We train teachers and creative practitioners of all disciplines to work together in devising creatively-based learning activities, and delivering them in the classroom across a period of several weeks.

Creative Schools is about the art of learning. Or maybe, more accurately, the art of collaborating and listening, challenging and discovering, failing and growing, thinking and reflecting. The art of understanding how difficult learning or even just being at school can be for some students, and then imagining how creativity might be able

to help ease or eliminate that difficulty. Or how creativity might increase the achievement for those who can already cope well. The bottom line is that the three R's are still important; it's just that there is more than one way of helping students achieve them.

While the in-school activities address a specific priority learning area as identified by the school and participating teacher (e.g. mathematics, HASS or science), they also aim to develop students' creative and critical thinking, problem-solving and team working skills. This approach has been shown, elsewhere in the world, to have a marked impact in schools in low socio-economic areas.

It's about providing new ways for learners to engage with subjects. With careful planning, appropriate professional support to teachers, and inspiring opportunities for children and young people to learn through arts and creativity FORM believes that Creative Schools can bring about significant improvements in motivation, engagement, confidence, behaviour and academic attainment.

Creative Schools helps to nurture the five 'creative habits of mind' that are so important to how children learn:

- · Collaboration
- · Persistence
- · Inquisitiveness
- · Imagination
- · Discipline

In extension to his own practice, Andrew is the Founder & Creative Director of Six Two Three Zero - an independent, Bunbury based initiative that seeks to use street art as a catalyst for urban development & social change by bringing communities together in conversation & creative inspiration. It is responsible for commissioning over 30+ large scale murals in Bunbury's CBD, with expansion into Armadale's CBD in 2017/18.



### **Felicity Groom**

Felicity Groom is a nationally renowned musician and mother of two. Felicity has released three LPs and one EP and has toured nationally and internationally. She completed a degree in film and continued her fine art work in the background of her career. Felicity worked for five years at UWA Out of Hours School Care from 2008, that had a rigorous program imagined and actioned by a group of young creatives which focused on creative and constructive play based learning. From there she went on to curate children's festival programs for Beaufort Street Festival, MT Hawthorn Festival and Fremantle Festival and also created and run bespoke activities for Joondalup Festival, Awesome Festival and at the Fremantle Arts Centre, All of these activities were individually planned and made specifically for the event that they were featured. In 2018 she was a creative practitioner for the trial of Creative Classrooms, then called The Art of Learning. During her two terms of work, kids created songs, found their inner super hero and played lots of fun imaginary games all centred around their curriculum. Currently Felicity is finishing her third album which will be released at the end of this year and is producing some visual projections in a collaborative arts project in conjunction with some of Australia's most recognised creators, for which she received Australian Council funding.
