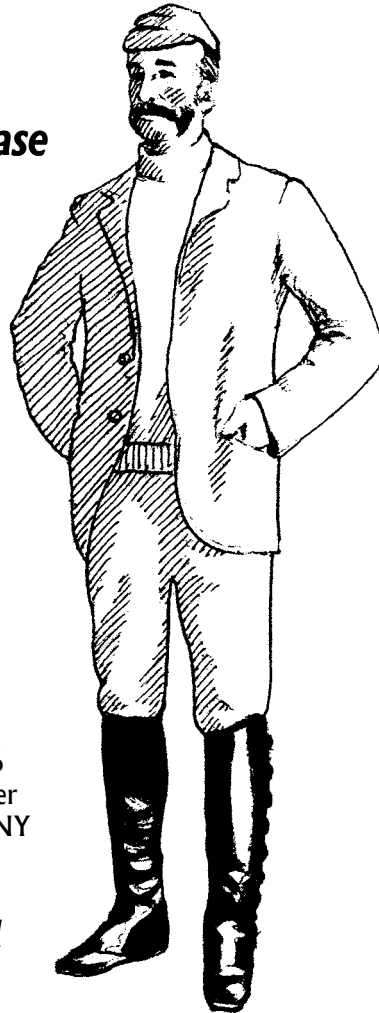

ABOUT THE SOCIETY

The New York State Thoracic Society is the State Chapter of the American Thoracic Society which celebrated its 100th Anniversary in 2005. It is the medical advisory body to the American Lung Association of New York State. It was formerly the NYS Trudeau Society, named after Edward Livingston Trudeau (1845-1915), who is depicted on our cover and for whom a lectureship at this annual meeting is named. The first American investigator to culture the tubercle bacillus, the causative agent in tuberculosis, he founded the Adirondack Cottage Sanitarium at Saranac Lake, New York, in 1884 based on his own open air cure of tuberculosis. The world famous Trudeau Research Institute at Saranac Lake retains his name.
