

### Administrator's Welcoming

In Cleveland, the name "St. Malachi Parish" evokes many responses. It is a name that is held in many, many peoples' memory banks as a beloved and revered place. To so many of the West Side Irish community, it is remembered as a refuge for their desperately pov-

erty-stricken forebears who came in the chaos that impacted the far western regions of County Mayo especially a very poor Island in the back of beyond called Achill. St. Malachi was a Catholic community that received, educated, and formed their children and their children's children. When better times arrived, and the community moved little by little out beyond Edgewater Beach, the memory of and concern for the old parish remained very strong.

When word of the newly formed program called Alcoholics' Anonymous began to spread out of Akron, the first AA meeting – the Angle group – formed at St. Malachi. St. Malachi has been a hospitable place for folks suffering from alcoholism and other addictions down through the years to this very day.

Not very long after the Second Vatican Council ended, an experiment in parish life was undertaken with the establishment of the Community of St. Malachi. It was a nonterritorial parochial experiment that tried to study and apply the principles of the Council to regular parish life and draw a strong base of lay leadership to undertake a broader ministerial and service outreach. St. Malachi now became a daily provider of food and services to the neighbors who lived in public housing in the nearby Lakeview Terrace housing and the homeless community of the near West Side. The "Back Door" ministry was undertaken to provide, throughout the day, a nourishing snack to men and women who did not have access to protein. Peanut butter became the protein of the day. Slowly, as the ministry developed, a full meal began to be provided, with all the necessary nutrition. Members of the Parish undertook a Monday night meal that, again, served the nutritional needs of the full families in the neighborhood.

any of the people we serve are fragile and it only takes one incident to turn their world upside down. It may be due to an illness, loss of a job, or helping another family member rather than taking care of themselves. Whatever the reason, they suddenly find themselves faced with the possibility of losing their apartment and being out on the streets.

Our main focus is helping people who live in our neighborhood. For those who don't, we provide them with names and phone numbers of Catholic churches in their area who might be able to help them financially.

Today Ray came to see me. He is out on the streets again. He was renting a room at CMHA from his friend and paying him \$50 every two weeks. In the past we gave Ray money for rent to keep him off the streets. He had a job painting a house. We found out today that he was never paid for his work. Unfortunately, this happens. With our urging he applied for housing with CMHA and is still waiting for an answer. We provided him with information to connect

acquel Jones is the Kitchen Coordinator for the St. Malachi Back Door Ministry. This ministry operates out of the "Back Door" of the St. Malachi Rectory, and hence its name. People can come 365 days of the year between 8:30 AM and 3 PM for a meal.

Racquel is celebrating her one-year anniversary on the job, having started in July 2018. She brings extensive experience in food service, which includes running both restaurants and her own catering company. She is the mother of three adult children and is blessed with five grandchildren. She was educated in Catholic schools and is an active leader in her church, Grace Missionary Baptist Church.

"The Back Door is more than feeding people – it is nurturing souls, feeding the whole person: mind, body, and soul," says Racquel. "People come for more than food and there is much more to this ministry than simply physically feeding people. People do come for food, and also for encouragement, a sense of community, and to be greeted with a smile. They come for a place where someone knows their names and to be with people that they can depend on."

The Back Door relies on volunteers and donations. Racquel continues, "Volunteers come from all walks of life. Middle-class and affluent people come to help those less fortunate. Others come to satisfy court-ordered community service. Children and high-schoolers come with their family or to fulfill service hours. Still others are former clients who become volunteers."

When asked to share just one story about her experience at the Back Door, Racquel said that every day is a new story. She shared about last Thanksgiving.

with a social worker who provides housing options for the homeless. Ray has pneumonia now and spent three days in the hospital. He is desperate. Fr. Mahoney approved another \$50 for rent and Ray was grateful and was planning to contact his former employer with the hope of getting a job.

Sometimes it is helping with rent and other times it is just helping them navigate through the system - straightening out a misunderstanding over an electric bill or helping to complete paper work to get a new cell phone and sometimes it's just letting them use our phone so that they can take care of personal business.



"It was very cold last year. When clients came, they were surprised to receive a complete Thanksgiving meal, with all the trimmings. By lunchtime, a crowd had gathered and they were cold and hungry. We didn't have gloves, so I gave out socks for people to place over their hands, and handwarmers. As the day continued, the crowd grew larger. Quite a few people asked if they could use my phone to call their families, asking if they could come home and be with the family. It was heartbreaking. But at the Back Door, people had a sense of family. They left well fed, had a little more bounciness, and had an experience of being loved."

emembering the abundance of the loaves and fishes, Monday Night Meal (MNM) volunteers continue Jesus's miracle by weekly welcoming and feeding our neighbors. Between 17-20 cooks each week (80 per month) prepare home-cooked meals. Quarterly menus are distributed in advance. Additional volunteers donate salad fixings and fruit (300 pieces) weekly. Volunteers pick up donated baked goods from local stores.

Early meal prep begins at 3:00 PM to put together the side dish, salads, fruits, and desserts for our guests. The serving crew arrives between 4:00-5:30 PM. Before serving at 6:00 PM, prayers of thanksgiving are offered for the crew and our guests. Meals are also transported and served at the Lakeview Terrace high rise. After serving and enjoying the home cooked meal, it's like at home ... wash the floors, tables, and the dishes.

Jesus's miracle continues through the many dedicated and generous volunteers who meet the challenge weekly in preparing for 350 meals. The St. Malachi Food Fund supplements the numerous needs of MNM through purchases of ongoing supplies and side dish necessities.
