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Dear Parents, Caregivers and Friends of the School,  
Tena Koutou Katoa Nga mihi nui Ki a Koutou Katoa,

Welcome back to all of our students for term three and a warm welcome to our new families who have joined us. I trust that you spent some quality time with loved ones and friends during the holidays? It was clear that your children enjoyed their break as they have returned with energy and enthusiasm for the term ahead.

Our Integrated Studies focus question this term is asking students 'How do we respond to adversity?'. This will be delivered through the lens of social science with a focus on the core competency of how to be a collaborative learner.

Students in Team Motuihe will be exploring and making personal connections to the term question. This will be done through rich learning opportunities which will examine the impact war has on individuals, communities and countries. Students' understanding will be further enhanced through their personal projects and a trip to the Auckland War Memorial Museum.

Team Rangitoto will explore the topic of adversity from three different perspectives. Beginning with looking at adversity in their own lives, what it has meant to them and what they have learned about themselves as they overcame events and/ or experiences. They will then look at famous figures throughout history who have overcome adversity and explore what they did and what the students can learn from them. The last focus will be student-led as they explore topics, people and issues important to them.

Team Motutapu is also looking at various forms of adversity and how people have overcome different forms of hardship and difficult situations. They will then be focusing on news reports, bulletins, and aspects of journalism as a lead-up to their final project.

Adversity causes some people to break and others to break records. In Team Rakino we believe life is full of ups and downs, victories and struggles and adversity is a big part of that experience. In line with this, the students will see that dealing with adversity can be a positive experience that can lead to growth and development. Each class will look at this from the perspective of real life examples, both historically and in the current day. The students will then pursue their own investigation with particular attention on finding the positive aspects.

Please be advised that we will be having an MOE allocated Teacher Only Day on Monday, 16 August 2021. Belmont Intermediate School will be closed for instruction on this day. The purpose of this teacher only day is to address planning and assessment, as well as teaching and learning strategies for diverse learners.

To work together in order to achieve the best possible outcomes for our children.




Conferences are not compulsory, so if you are happy with your child's progress, achievement and personal development, you are not obliged to book a meeting.

## Focus On.....Music & Performing Arts

Students in both Year 7 and Year 8 are introduced to the elements of music (beat, rhythm, pitch, tempo, dynamics and tone colour) and dance (body awareness, space, time, energy and relationships) via a practical approach.

### Year 7

Students learn about the main sections and instruments of an orchestra through focused listening and viewing. Those who already play any of the orchestral instruments are encouraged to share their talents by performing to their specialist group. Others enjoy 'having a go' on instruments such as brass, woodwinds, violins and percussion with interesting results! They also enjoy playing xylophones and glockenspiels in order to create pentatonic compositions.

Year 7 students also learn to play the guitar, learning to strum rhythmically, read chord diagrams and change chords smoothly. They play a variety of songs which become increasingly challenging. Those who are already competent guitarists are encouraged to select their own material and work at a level which challenges them.

Dance is included in the programme and the elements of dance are explored through creative movement working in pairs or small groups. Talented dancers are encouraged to exercise leadership. By the end of the module each group has created a short dance incorporating all the elements of dance and this is performed to the classroom teacher.



### Year 8

Year 8 students also play the guitar but at a more advanced level. They work in pairs or threes to compose a short blues or pop song which is performed to their specialist group after several weeks of preparation. For many, presenting the song to their peers is a major challenge, but others relish the opportunity to share their talents.

Using the music hubs is a major collaborative challenge. A group of five or six students forms a band and uses the music hubs to perform a song of their choice.

The hub enables each student to connect with their instruments (rhythm guitar, bass guitar, keyboard, drums and vocalist) and through headphones hear the others in their band. Students learn how to set up the hubs correctly so that

everything works and there is a balanced sound. This requires patience and problem solving. Once the group feels they have succeeded they are able to record their song on a USB. Groups also learn to pack up the hubs ready for the following class to use, ensuring all instruments, leads, headphones and music stands are stored correctly.

Several years ago the PTA provided funding to the 'tune' of \$9000 so that the students could enjoy this experience and the majority of students find it challenging and fun.

Year 8 students learn social dancing as part of their class Physical Education programme and this prepares them for the traditional end of year 'Grad Dance' which is a fabulous memorable, occasion.

Robyn Norwell has taught at BIS for 20 years and started teaching Music and Performing Arts full time in 2009. She offers an engaging program for both experienced and inexperienced musicians and her patience is endless! We are fortunate to have such a passionate teacher educating our students in all things musical.
