Assisted Living Guidelines



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ASSISTED LIVING RESIDENCES offered at the manors and villages operated by Presbyterian Manors of Mid-America are licensed by the state government in which the residences are located. Maintenance of the license to operate the assisted living residences requires compliance with the standards established by the state issuing the license. While state standards vary somewhat from state to state, there are some assisted living guidelines that are consistent across all Presbyterian Manors of Mid-America locations, and among those standards are provisions that are important in defining expectations governed by state standards and regulatory actions.

Assisted living consists of providing 24-hour-per-day shelter, board, and protective oversight for individuals with a need for assistance or cueing with activities of daily living (ADL), consisting of one or more of the following:

- Eating
- Dressing
- Bathing
- Toileting
- Transferring
- Walking

By regulatory standards we are not permitted to admit or continue to care for residents whose needs cannot be met by us. If services needed by a resident cannot be provided in our assisted living residence, we are required to refer the resident to an appropriate outside source, or discharge the resident from the assisted living residence. Examples of the conditions that may prompt referral or discharge include:

- A resident receiving active treatment for mental illness or drug/alcohol abuse
- A resident who is immobile
- A resident with incontinence, in which the resident cannot, or will not, participate in management of the problem
- A resident who requires ongoing physical assistance with transferring
- A resident with symptoms of dementia that exceed manageability/safety
- A condition in which the manor/village is unable to provide the necessary isolation precautions to treat a resident's infectious disease
- A resident requiring use of physical or chemical restraints
- A resident's behavior that presents a reasonable likelihood of serious harm to the resident or to others
