Anticoagulation Nursing Course

The first Anticoagulation Nursing Course at the University of Hertfordshire has now been completed with the initial 20 students receiving their certificates.

It has been very successful and the evaluation of the course by the students extremely positive.

A large number of the students are now going forward to complete their accreditation and thereby gain C.A.T.S points at either Masters Degree or Diploma level.

Due to the high level of demand for the course the University has decided to add an additional course to the 2002/2003 year.

There will then be 3 courses instead of 2 per Academic year.

Each of these courses will have 6 study days divided into 3 groups of 2 days.

This will be of benefit to people travelling long distances as it will mean a reduction in the number of journeys.

Rebecca Brown (Course Tutor) would like to thank all the students who attended the first course for making it so enjoyable. Everybody found the sharing of information about their own methods and challenges very rewarding and feel that the support networks that have developed will be a help in the future.

Application Guidelines for the Travel / Education Scholarship are:-

- The CLOT Committee will consider sponsorship applications for travel and accommodation expenses from members wishing to attend the Anticoagulant Management Course. The Committee will not fund the Course fees.
- 2. Sponsorship will be granted to those members who travel for more than 2 hours to the study venue.
- 3. A maximum of £50 per night will be paid for accommodation costs. Members will be expected to pay any excess if they wish to upgrade.
- 4. Car travel expenses will be paid at 20 pence per mile with a maximum travel claim of £50 per return trip. Members start and end mileage will be requested.
- 5. Train expenses will be paid up to a maximum travel claim of £50 per return trip. Apex tickets should be arranged wherever possible.
- 6. Air travel claims will be considered.

5. We have been trying to implement a Patient Group Directive for administering and supplying both Warfarin and Low Molecular Weight Heparin.

The head of Pharmacy has explained that

The head of Pharmacy has explained that this is not suitable in our situation and we

need to wait for further information from the Government regarding "Supplementary" prescribing. How do you manage in-patient dosing as nurses are not allowed to advise other nurses to give a Warfarin dose without a doctor's signature?

We also have a problem patient who consistently misses doses, adjusts the dose when drinking alcohol and frequently alters the recommended dose. The patient has also been abusive, attends A&E over the weekend if a dose has been missed and demands LMWH and turns up for tests out of clinic times. A formal letter has been sent out by the Chief Ex.

New Look For CLOT

To support the continuing education of the increasing number of specialist nurses in anticoagulation the Committee agreed to a new format for CLOT study day events. This will mean that:

- The study days/meetings will be held twice a year.
- There will be a venue in the North and the South. The North will be held in Manchester (Bury) and the South event held in Warwick.
- 3. Each meeting will be over 1½ days commencing on Sunday afternoon and finishing on Monday afternoon. Members will have the option of attending the Monday only (1 day) or the full event (1½ days).
- The format for the Sunday afternoon will consist of related workshops and short lectures run by members who wish to promote good practice from primary and secondary care.



- 5. The format for the Monday will remain the same as present.
- CLOT members will be encouraged to make suggestions regarding speakers and content speakers will receive book tokens £50 and overnight accommodation will be provided which includes an evening meal and breakfast
- All CLOT members will be invited to submit posters for display during the meeting. All entrants will receive a bottle of wine with the winning entrant receiving £150.
- A social event will be organised for the Sunday evening. Overnight accommodation in the venue hotel will be available to CLOT members only at a discounted price.
- The cost for attending the Study day for CLOT members will be £25 for 1 day (Monday only) and £35 for 1½ days (full meeting).

CLOT Website


