And, a message became apparent through a 1947 classic Christmas movie that does not get quite as much attention as some of the others, but its message is just as heartwarming and inspiring. The movie is the 1947 classic "The Bishop's Wife," with Cary Grant, David Niven, and Loretta Young. Cary Grant's character is an angel named Dudley who has come to help out Henry Brougham an Episcopal Bishop, played by David Niven. The premise for the angel's visit is that the Bishop has lost his way with what is truly important in his life.

I am sure many of our residents are familiar with this classic Christmas movie. But, for those who have not had the pleasure of seeing it and for the sake of my message for this letter, the movie ends with Bishop Brougham preaching a sermon on Christmas Eve. All the stockings are filled, all that is, except one. And we have even forgotten to hang it up. The stocking for the child born in a manger. It is his birthday we are celebrating. Do not let us ever forget that.

Let us ask ourselves what He would wish for most. And then, let each put in his share, loving-kindness, warm hearts, and a stretched out hand of tolerance. All the shinning gifts that make peace on earth."

The message is still so very appropriate and valid today as it was in 1947, so I thought it would be a perfect message to share with our residents, their families, our employees and our friends. That simple message of what He would wish for most is true. I could not add one more thing to the original list of loving kindness, warm hearts and stretched out hand of tolerance, which are all the gifts that make peace on earth. Let us try to provide these gifts this Christmas as our gifts to the child born in a manger so very long ago.

As we still navigate COVID during this Christmas and well into 2022, let us not forget these words. These gifts will be our path to winning the war against this ever-changing virus and healing the division that we have seen these past couple years.
