

PMMA's COVID-19 Response Timeline

September 23, 2020 - Wichita Presbyterian Manor learned two essential health care workers are positive for COVID-19 following surveillance testing for the virus at the campus earlier in the week. Families, residents and employees were notified regarding the positive employees. The county health department affirmed the campus' plan to test residents who had potential exposure on September 28.

September 22, 2020 - An employee at Rolla Presbyterian Manor tested positive for COVID-19. The employee was tested as part of Presbyterian Manor's ongoing surveillance testing for employees September 15 and that test was negative. The employee notified the community that several close contacts had tested positive, and when the employee began to show signs and symptoms, they asked to be tested for COVID-19. The employee came to the campus for a drive-through test using a point-of-care testing machine, and the result was positive. The Phelps County Health Department was notified of the positive case.

September 21, 2020 - Arkansas City Presbyterian Manor announced that two memory care residents tested positive for COVID-19. On Friday, September 18, the community tested 199 individuals. 112 of those were staff and 87 were residents. Of those tested, 197 were negative and two were positive. The community conducted contact tracing and have notified the Cowley County Health Department and the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) Epidemiology Hotline. Another round of testing was scheduled for the following week.

September 20, 2020 - A third essential health care worker at Farmington Presbyterian Manor tested positive for COVID-19. The employee's surveillance test September 15 was negative, however, the employee began to experience symptoms of COVID-19 and sought testing. The positive result was received September 20. The employee last worked September 17 and passed pre-shift screening. Residents will be tested September 21 and employee surveillance testing will be conducted as planned.

September 19, 2020 - A second essential health care worker at Farmington Presbyterian Manor tested positive for COVID-19 in the community's surveillance testing for the virus September 15. The campus tested 139 employees. The employee passed employee screening and was at work when the results were received. The staff member was immediately sent home. Residents will be tested September 21 and employee surveillance testing will be conducted as planned.

September 18, 2020 - After its third round of surveillance testing, Manor of the Plains identified three cases of COVID-19 among 3 direct-care staff and 1 COVID-positive resident. The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) Epidemiology Hotline and Ford County Health Department were notified and recommended mass testing of all residents the following week, coordinated with the community's surveillance testing dates. The campus was awaiting results

of a mass test of all residents and a second round of surveillance testing that took place on Wednesday, September 16.

September 18, 2020 - A second essential health care worker at Arkansas City Presbyterian Manor tested positive for COVID-19 in the community's surveillance testing for the virus September 15. The campus tested 112 employees and received 1 positive and 111 negative test results. The employee, who has been wearing personal protective equipment (PPE) as recommended, worked September 14 in memory care. The Cowley County Health Department was notified. The health department recommended testing memory care residents when the community conducted its next round of surveillance testing September 18.

September 18, 2020 – Farmington Presbyterian Manor learned an essential health care worker who last worked September 8 tested positive for COVID-19 in employee surveillance screening. Due to the exposure reported September 16, resident testing is already scheduled for September 21. Employee surveillance testing will continue.

September 17, 2020 – The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) issued new guidance on in-person indoor and outdoor visitation at skilled nursing facilities.

September 17, 2020 - Topeka Presbyterian Manor announced that a third party, non-direct resident care contractor tested positive for COVID-19. The Shawnee County Health Department and the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) Epidemiology Hotline were notified. Because the contractor did not have direct contact with any residents or employees for an extended period of time, no additional testing was recommended. The positive test was the result of ongoing weekly testing at the community.

September 17, 2020 - In its second week of surveillance testing, Aberdeen Village discovered two positive cases of COVID-19. These case of COVID-19 were detected during Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) mandated surveillance testing of employees conducted September 15, bringing the 7-day total for cases to 2 employees and 1 contracted health care provider. The Johnson County Health Department and Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) Epidemiology Hotline were notified. The health department recommended placing the residents in memory care and the health care neighborhoods where the contractor worked in quarantine and testing the residents in five days and again a week later to ensure sufficient viral load for testing accuracy.

September 16, 2020 - Farmington Presbyterian Manor announced that an essential healthcare employee tested positive for the virus. The St. Francois County Health Department recommended testing all health care residents on September 17, and again four days later. The employee who tested positive is recovering outside of the community.

September 16, 2020 - Two independent living residents tested positive for COVID-19 at Arkansas City Presbyterian Manor after a potential exposure off-campus. This brought the total number of cases at the campus to three – two residents and one staff member, who was reported to families on September 11. The residents were self-monitoring for signs and

symptoms and began to quarantine on Saturday, September 12. The health department recommended testing all independent living and assisted living residents for COVID-19 during the next round of employee surveillance testing.

September 16, 2020 - A Heart & Soul Hospice of Wichita direct-patient care employee tested positive for COVID-19. The employee quarantined at home. The hospice notified the Sedgwick County Health Department and performed contact tracing to determine who the employee had contact with during the last shift worked. Patients and their family members were notified of the positive test.

September 15, 2020 – Aberdeen Heights learned that an independent living resident has tested positive for COVID-19. The resident and the resident’s spouse self-quarantined Thursday, September 8, after learning they had been exposed by a close contact who they had recently visited. The couple sought testing on Friday, September 11 and learned Sunday evening, September 13, that one of them had tested positive for COVID-19. The community continued to cooperate with the St. Louis County Health Department.

September 14, 2020 - Parsons Presbyterian Manor’s COVID-19 outbreak was closed, according to the Labette County Health Department. With no new cases identified at the community since August 16, two full incubation periods passed with no new positive cases of COVID-19.

September 12, 2020 - An essential health care worker at Arkansas City Presbyterian Manor tested positive for COVID-19 in the community’s first round of surveillance testing for the virus. The employee worked September 7 and was one of 115 tested on September 8 in the first round of surveillance testing. The results were received September 11. The employee last worked September 11 and passed the employee pre-shift screening. When the community was notified of the positive result, the employee was immediately notified and sent home. Results were pending for a second round of testing September 10 for the campus’ 115 employees. The residents in the health care center were placed in isolation and employees took COVID-19 precautions.

September 11, 2020 - Wichita Presbyterian Manor announced that a direct resident care employee tested positive for COVID-19. This case of COVID-19 was detected during Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) mandated surveillance testing of employees. Contact tracing determined that the employee had contact with several residents and one other employee during their shift. Per recommendations from the Sedgwick County Health Department, we planned to test all residents in the unit where the employee worked. Families, residents and employees were notified regarding the positive employee.

September 11, 2020 - An essential health care worker who last worked September 8 tested positive for COVID-19 at Fort Scott Presbyterian Village. Through contact tracing, one other employee and one resident were identified as close contacts. The employee was quarantined, and the resident was placed in self-isolation in their residence. Employees working with the resident took COVID-19 isolation precautions, which include wearing gowns, glove, eye protection and surgical masks. The Bourbon County Health Department was notified and

recommended isolating the resident for 14 days and monitoring for symptoms. No additional testing was recommended. Families were called to alert them to the positive case, and all state and county mandatory required reporting agencies were notified.

September 10, 2020 - Aberdeen Village discovered a non-direct care employee was positive for COVID-19 after starting regular surveillance testing of employees at the community. This case of COVID-19 was detected during Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) mandated surveillance testing of employees. The Johnson County Health Department did not recommend additional testing since the employee did not have direct contact with any other employees during their shift.

September 8, 2020 - Heart & Soul Hospice of Farmington learned September 8 that a direct-patient care employee tested positive for COVID-19. The hospice acted swiftly to notify the St. Francois County Health Department and perform contact tracing to determine who the employee had contact with during their last shifts worked. Patients and their family members were notified of the positive test.

September 8, 2020 – PMMA’s communities began their first round of employee surveillance testing mandated by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) for all skilled nursing facilities. Surveillance testing requires all employees, agency employees, volunteers, hospice, lab and therapy providers at a campus to be tested on a frequency determined by that county’s COVID-19 testing positivity rate.

September 7, 2020 - Newton Presbyterian Manor announced that a non-direct resident care employee tested positive for COVID-19. Contact tracing determined that the employee did not have direct contact with any residents or employees during their shift, during which personal protective equipment (PPE) was worn.

September 4, 2020 - Topeka Presbyterian Manor announced that a non-direct resident care employee tested positive for COVID-19. The Shawnee County Health Department and the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) Epidemiology Hotline were notified. The health department recommended contact tracing and testing residents and employees who had close contact with the COVID-positive employee. One PMMA corporate employee was identified as a close contact and is now in quarantine. No other employees or residents were identified through contact tracing.

September 4, 2020 - A resident who previously tested positive for COVID-19 died at Lawrence Presbyterian Manor, as the community received good news from COVID-19 testing and the Douglas County Health Department. The resident was being cared for by the COVID-19 Rapid Response Team in a designated area of the community. The community tested health care residents and employees on September 1. All tests were negative for the virus. The Douglas County Health Department did not recommend additional testing and has cleared the campus of the COVID-19 cluster designation.

September 4, 2020 - Manor of the Plains identified another case of COVID-19. The case was identified through the community's new employee screening process, which includes a COVID-19 test. The employee passed pre-screening upon entry to the building for orientation. The campus conducted contact tracing to determine who meets the CDC guidelines for direct contact within 6 feet for 10 minutes or longer. The employee had direct contact with one employee at the campus and was not in contact with any residents. Both employees wore masks and practiced social distancing. That employee was scheduled to be rapid tested prior to their next shift. No other testing was recommended.

September 4, 2020 - Farmington Presbyterian Manor received good news following a third round of mass testing at the community September 1 and 2, after two employees and a contract health care worker tested positive at the community in August. The campus continued to pre-screen employees before they have contact with residents and check residents for signs and symptoms of COVID-19 during each shift.

September 4, 2020 - A memory care resident tested positive for COVID-19 at Rolla Presbyterian Manor 19 in campus-wide testing at the community. The campus tested 122 residents and employees on September 2 and received the test results September 3. Through contact tracing, it was determined that two contract therapists and the resident's spouse, who is an assisted living resident, might have been exposed. The contract therapists will self-quarantine and the resident's spouse will remain in isolation pending COVID-19 testing scheduled for September 8.

September 2, 2020 – Lawrence Presbyterian Manor once again received good news after testing all health care residents and selected employees identified as potentially at-risk after two health care workers tested positive for COVID-19 last week. All residents and employees tested negative for COVID-19.

September 1, 2020 – Emporia Presbyterian Manor received good news after testing 24 health care residents and 41 employees August 24. All residents and employees tested negative for the virus. The Flint Hills Community Health Department recommends conducting another round of testing the week of September 7.

August 31, 2020 – A non-direct resident care employee at Manor of the Plains tested positive for COVID-19. The employee last worked August 26 and passed the employee pre-shift screening. The employee has not been on the schedule, but called in today for a shift reporting signs and symptoms consistent with COVID-19. The employee was asked to get a rapid test, which is positive. We have conducted contact tracing to determine who meets the CDC guidelines for direct contact within 6 feet for 10 minutes or longer. Ten employees have been identified. The health department recommends testing the potentially exposed employees Sept. 1.

August 30, 2020 – Rolla Presbyterian Manor announced an essential health care worker has tested positive for COVID-19. An essential health care employee who last worked Wednesday, August 26, in health care and Tuesday, August 25, in memory care has tested positive for COVID-19. The employee passed employee pre-screening for both shifts and was not scheduled to work Thursday. The employee called prior to their Friday shift to report an exposure and said they were going to get tested for COVID-19. The result was reported to the campus in the evening August 30. The Phelps County Health Department recommends testing all residents and employees at the community this week. Testing will be done September 2.

August 29, 2020 - After a tough week, Parsons Presbyterian Manor received good news following their latest round of mass testing on August 28. The community conducted 90 COVID-19 tests on Friday. All residents, employees, agency health care workers and therapists tested were negative for COVID-19. Per Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) guidelines, residents and employees who previously tested positive were not re-tested. The health department has determined three of the five employees who previously tested positive are recovered. Upon the employees' return to work, we will follow CDC recommendations related to work practices and restrictions. If the community has no additional positives by September 13, the local health department will clear the community of the cluster designation.

August 28, 2020 – Farmington Presbyterian Manor received good news with their second round of mass testing of residents and employees August 25 and 26. All employees and residents tested were negative for the virus. The St. Francois County Health Department recommended mass testing again September 1 and 2.

August 28, 2020 - A second resident who previously tested positive for COVID-19 has died at Parsons Presbyterian Manor. The resident was being cared for by the COVID-19 Rapid Response Team in a designated area of the community. Parsons Presbyterian Manor will continue to work with the Labette County Health Department, KDHE, CMS and the CDC to stay current on all recommendations for resident care and safety.

August 28, 2020 – Aberdeen Heights received more good news following selective testing at the community August 27. The testing was conducted after two employees tested positive the week of August 23. The community tested 66 residents and 99 employees in The Glen due to possible exposure to an essential health care worker who tested positive August 23. An additional 6 residents and 2 employees were tested following a potential exposure to a non-direct resident care employee who works in independent living. At this time, the St. Louis County Health Department recommends re-testing the residents and employees of The Glen again, which will be done on Wednesday, September 2.

August 27, 2020 - Aberdeen Village has learned another non-direct resident care employee has tested positive for COVID-19. The employee, who last worked August 15, reported a possible exposure after returning from an out-of-state trip. The Johnson County Health Department and Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) Epidemiology Hotline have been notified, along with all other required federal and state agencies. The Johnson County Health Department does not recommend additional testing at this time because the employee has not worked since August 15 and their exposure can be traced to their out of state trip.

August 27, 2020 – Lawrence Presbyterian Manor had a set-back in its fight against COVID-19. After receiving all negative test results from mass testing August 18, two employees tested positive in follow-up testing August 26. Both employees, who are essential healthcare workers, tested negative for COVID-19 on August 18. One employee, who works part-time, has not worked since. The second employee last worked August 25 and passed the pre-shift employee screening. The Douglas County Health Department recommended re-testing all health care residents and employees who meet the CDC guidelines for close contacts with possible exposure. Testing will be done September 1.

August 27, 2020 - A resident who previously tested positive for COVID-19 died at Parsons Presbyterian Manor. The resident was being cared for by the COVID-19 Rapid Response Team in a designated area of the community. With additional positives in the building, the community is continuing weekly mass testing at the direction of the Labette County Health Department and the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

August 26, 2020 - Aberdeen Heights once again reports a non-direct resident care employee has tested positive for the virus. This brings the senior living community's 7-day total to 2 employees who have tested positive for COVID-19. The employee last worked Friday, August 21 and passed the employee pre-shift screening. Following the shift, the employee began to experience signs and symptoms of COVID-19 and sought testing on Monday, August 24. The employee notified the community of the positive test late on Tuesday, August 25. Residents and employees who meet the criteria will be asked to self-quarantine and be tested for COVID-19 with residents and employees of The Glen, which was already planned this week.

August 26, 2020 – The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) announced new rules requirement skilled nursing facilities to test employees regularly based upon county transmission rates. Communities in counties with less than 5% transmission rates are required to test monthly, communities in counties with transmission rates between 5 and 10% are required to test weekly, and communities in counties with transmission rates greater than 10% are required to test twice a week. The rule was effective immediately. PMMA began working on plans for implementation of the new rules at all 16 communities.

August 23, 2020 – An essential health care worker at Aberdeen Heights tested positive for COVID-19. The employee last worked Friday, August 21. The employee sought COVID testing

after feeling ill over the weekend and received a positive test result late on Saturday, August 22. Aberdeen Heights conducted contact tracing, which determined an additional employee may have been exposed to the virus. That individual, also an essential healthcare employee, has been asked to quarantine at home. The St. Louis County Health Department has recommended mass testing for all employees of The Glen, as well as residents in memory care and the health care center.

August 23, 2020 – In mass testing at Farmington Presbyterian Manor, an essential health care employee and a contract health care worker tested positive for COVID-19. These cases brought the community's 7-day total to 3 positive employees. The St. Francois County Health Department recommended mass testing later in the week.

August 22, 2020 – Parsons Presbyterian Manor received a bit of good news following another round of mass testing of residents and employees at the community. All residents and employees tested were negative for COVID-19. The community will conduct another round of mass testing next August 29.

August 22, 2020 - Fort Scott Presbyterian Manor has good news to share following a second wave of testing for COVID-19 at the community. All residents and employees have tested negative for the virus. Because all residents and employees tested negative for the virus, the Bourbon County Health Department is not recommending further testing at the community at this time.

August 21, 2020 – Aberdeen Heights announced results from its latest round of COVID-19 testing. Following three positive employee tests in 7 days, employees who work in the affected department were tested for COVID-19. All tested negative for the COVID-19 virus. The St. Louis County Health Department did not recommend additional testing.

August 21, 2020 – An essential health care worker at Emporia Presbyterian Manor tested positive for COVID-19. This was the second positive case in 7 days. The employee last worked the morning of August 21, and wore a mask while working per CDC guidelines. The employee noticed symptoms consistent with the virus and those symptoms persisted, leading to a positive COVID-19 test. The Flint Hills Community Health Department had already recommended testing all health care residents and employees and did not recommend additional actions. Testing will be done August 24.

August 21, 2020 – A non-direct resident care employee at Manor of the Plains tested positive for COVID-19. The employee last worked August 14 and has been at home due to possible exposure to a significant other who was positive for the virus. The employee recently began noticing symptoms consistent with COVID-19 and sought testing. They notified the campus of the positive test result once obtained. The Kansas Department of Health and Environment

(KDHE) epidemiology hotline and Ford County Health Department were notified immediately. Because no one else at Manor of the Plains was exposed to the virus, no testing is necessary.

August 20, 2020 – Lawrence Presbyterian Manor received good news with the results of mass testing conducted August 20. The community tested 35 residents and 92 employees, including six members of the therapy staff. All tests were negative for COVID-19. Following the negative results, the health department recommends another round of testing for health care residents and all employees again next week.

August 19, 2020 – Emporia Presbyterian Manor learned an essential health care employee tested positive for COVID-19. The employee last worked on Sunday, August 16, and wore a mask while working per CDC guidelines. The employee began to notice symptoms the following day and those symptoms persisted, leading to a positive COVID-19 test August 19. Per Flint Hills Community Health Department, all health care residents and employees will be tested for COVID-19 August 24.

August 19, 2020 - Heart & Soul Hospice of Farmington (Mo.) learned that a non-direct resident care employee tested positive for COVID-19. The employee last saw patients on August 12 and passed self-screening, which includes a temperature check and answering screening questions about their health and COVID-19 exposure risks, and reviewing a set of possible COVID-19 symptoms. Later in the day, the employee began to feel symptoms consistent with COVID-19. The symptoms worsened over the next several days, and the employee sought a COVID-19 test on Monday, August 17. The positive result was received August 19. Through contact tracing, no other employees and no patients met the CDC definition of close contact. No additional testing was required by the St. Francois County Health Department.

August 18, 2020 – Farmington Presbyterian Manor learned a direct resident care employee tested positive for COVID-19. The employee last worked August 14 in the health care center. The employee passed pre-shift screening and wore personal protective equipment (PPE) as recommended by the CDC. The employee began to feel unwell over the weekend and called in to work on August 17. The employee sought a COVID-19 test and notified their supervisor of the positive test. The St. Francois County Health Department recommended mass testing later in the week.

August 17, 2020 – Manor of the Plains tested 132 residents and employees August 13 after another employee tested positive for COVID-19. All 132 tests were negative. The Ford County Health Department will not require any additional testing. The community will continue with the preventive measures in place for combatting COVID-19. The community will be able to resume its reopening process in the coming days as recommended by the Kansas Department of Aging and Disability Services (KDADS).

August 16, 2020 – A third non-direct resident care employee at Aberdeen Heights tested positive for COVID-19 in a 7-day period. The employee, who last worked August 12, passed the pre-shift screening. On August 14, the employee called in, reporting they were experiencing symptoms consistent with the virus. The employee sought COVID testing and received the positive result late today. Employees in the affected area will be tested for COVID-19 this week.

August 16, 2020 – Three more residents and an additional direct resident care employee tested positive for COVID-19 at Parsons Presbyterian Manor in mass testing conducted over the weekend. Two are health care residents and one is an assisted living resident. All three were moved to the designated COVID-19 area, where they will be cared for by the COVID-19 Rapid Response Team. The employee will continue to quarantine at home. This brings the total number of cases to 8 residents and 5 employees in the past 7 days. The campus is considered a COVID-19 cluster, which is two or more non-household cases of COVID-19 associated with a location during a specified period of time. Another round of mass testing will be conducted within the next 7 days and isolation precautions will continue at the community.

August 16, 2020 – Three residents at Lawrence Presbyterian Manor tested positive for COVID-19. The community tested 10 residents and 4 employees at the direction of the Douglas County Health Department after an employee tested positive for the virus August 11. Seven residents and all 4 employees tested negative. The health department recommends campus-wide testing. Due to the number of positive cases, the community is now considered a COVID-19 cluster. A cluster is two or more non-household cases of COVID-19 associated with a location during a specified time frame. Approximately 130 residents and employees will be tested within the next few days.

August 15, 2020 – A Parsons Presbyterian Manor essential health care worker has tested positive for COVID-19, bringing the campus' total to 5 residents and 4 employees positive for the virus. The employee last worked August 6 and passed the pre-shift screening. The employee began to experience signs and symptoms of COVID-19 and was tested August 8. The results were negative. The employee's symptoms did not abate, and a second test was sought August 14. The second test was positive. The Labette County Health Department was notified and did not recommend any additional contact tracing due to the length of time since the employee last worked and the community's planned mass testing on August 15 and 16.

August 14, 2020 – Newton Presbyterian Manor tested 50 residents and 134 employees August 10 in mass testing after the community was designated a COVID-19 cluster a week ago. All the tests were negative. The community is awaiting testing instructions and next steps for closing the cluster designation. The positive resident has been released from isolation and all previously positive employees have been cleared to return to work by the health department.

August 14, 2020 – A second non-direct resident care employee at Aberdeen Heights tested positive for COVID-19. The employee last worked August 13. On Monday, August 10, the employee called in, reporting they were not feeling well. The employee did not work Monday through Wednesday and sought COVID testing on August 10. The test was still pending when the employee returned to work on

August 13 after reporting they were feeling better. The employee reported early on August 14 that the test result was positive. Contact tracing was conducted and employees with direct contact were asked to quarantine for 14 days.

August 14, 2020 – A second resident at Fort Scott Presbyterian Village has tested positive for COVID-19 in the campus-wide testing August 13. The community tested 71 employees and residents. Due to the presence of two or more cases of COVID-19 at the community within the past 7 days, the community is now considered a COVID-19 cluster. The residents will be cared for in isolation by the COVID-19 Rapid Response Team. The residents will remain in isolation until symptom free in accordance with CDC guidelines. Another round of campus-wide testing will be conducted within 7 days.

August 13, 2020 – A resident at Fort Scott Presbyterian Village has tested positive for COVID-19. The resident began showing signs and symptoms of COVID-19 and reported them to staff August 12. The resident was tested for COVID-19 and the positive result was returned today. The resident will be cared for in isolation by the COVID-19 Rapid Response Team. The Bourbon County Health Department recommended mass testing for all residents and employees.

August 11, 2020 – A direct-resident care employee at Lawrence Presbyterian Manor has tested positive for COVID-19. The employee last worked August 9 in the health care center and passed the employee screening. The employee was tested on August 10 and notified the campus of the test on August 11. The positive test placed the campus' reopening plan on hold. The Douglas County Health Department recommended contact tracing and testing any employees and residents who had potential exposure.

August 10, 2020 – A non-direct resident care employee at Aberdeen Heights tested positive for COVID-19. The employee last worked Sunday, August 2 and passed the employee screening. The employee was tested August 5 and notified the campus of the positive test on August 10. The campus conducted contact tracing and asked the affected employees to quarantine at home.

August 9, 2020 – Parsons Presbyterian Manor tested 114 residents and employees for COVID-19 after 2 residents and 1 employee tested positive August 7 and 8. Three additional residents and two additional employees tested positive. The residents were moved to the designated COVID-19 area to be cared for by the COVID-19 Rapid Response Team. The campus will conduct another round of testing in 7 days at the direction of the health department. CDC and KDHE guidelines will be used to determine when residents can leave the COVID-19 unit and when employees can return to work.

August 8, 2020 – Three Aberdeen Village employees tested for COVID-19 have tested negative for the virus. The three employees, who are not involved in providing direct care to residents, were tested following a potential exposure to another employee who tested positive for COVID-19.

August 8, 2020 – A health care resident at Parsons Presbyterian Manor began showing signs and symptoms of COVID-19. The resident and the resident's roommate were tested for COVID-19, and both were positive for the virus. The residents were moved to the designated COVID-19 area to be cared for by the COVID-19 Rapid Response Team. The Labette County Health Department recommended mass testing for the campus, which was done August 8 and 9.

August 7, 2020 – A non-direct resident care employee at Parsons Presbyterian Manor tested positive for COVID-19. The community conducted contact tracing and identified 4 employees who were at exposure risk. They are self-quarantining at home and will be tested for COVID-19 before returning to work.

August 7, 2020 – A second Fort Scott Presbyterian Village non-direct resident care employee tested positive for COVID-19. Seven employees and two residents were tested after being identified as close contacts of an employee who tested positive for COVID-19 on August 1. The employees have been in quarantine at home and the residents have been in self-isolation at the campus. Six employees and two residents tested negative for the virus. The Bourbon County health department did not recommend additional testing but continuing to screen employees and monitor residents for signs and symptoms of COVID-19.

August 7, 2020 – Another Aberdeen Village non-direct resident care employee has tested positive for COVID-19. The employee, who last worked July 30, has been in self-quarantine since that date to exposure to another campus employee who tested positive for the virus. Due to the length of time the employee has been in quarantine, the health department does not recommend additional testing.

August 7, 2020 – An essential health care worker at Manor of the Plains who last worked August 6 tested positive for COVID-19 in a rapid test. The employee, who works in health care, passed the screening when reporting for work and wore PPE as recommended throughout their shift. The employee began experiencing symptoms today and sought a rapid test, which was positive. The Ford County Health Department recommends testing all residents and employees for COVID-19 within 7 days.

August 7, 2020 – Wichita Presbyterian Manor received word that five employees who had been exposed to another employee who tested positive for COVID-19 have tested negative for the virus. The Sedgwick County Health Department recommends continuing with the precautions and screening that are in place.

August 5, 2020 – A non-direct resident care employee at Aberdeen Village tested positive for COVID-19. The employee last worked August 1 and passed employee screening. The employee called in for their next scheduled shift August 3 and notified the campus August 5 of the positive test result. The community conducted contact tracing and identified employees who had potential exposure. Those employees will be tested for COVID-19.

August 5, 2020 – Newton Presbyterian Manor tested 138 employees and 47 residents for COVID-19. Of those tested, 3 employees and 1 resident tested positive for the virus. The Harvey County Health Department was notified of the test results, and designated the community a COVID-19 cluster. Clusters are defined as two or more non-household COVID-19 cases identified in a certain place in a specified time frame. The health department recommended re-testing in 7 days. The positive resident and the resident's roommate were placed in isolation in a designated COVID-19 area to be cared for by the COVID-19 Rapid Response Team. The employees are recuperating at home and will return to work when they meet CDC and KDHE guidelines for returning to work.

August 4, 2020 – **Aberdeen Village** received zero deficiencies on a focused infection control survey conducted by the Kansas Department of Aging and Disability Services (KDADS) on August 4.

August 3, 2020 – A Wichita Presbyterian Manor employee tested positive for COVID-19 after a close contact of the employee tested positive for the virus. The employee last worked July 29 and passed the employee screening. Contact tracing was conducted and five possible exposures were identified. These employees were asked to quarantine pending a COVID-19 test.

August 3, 2020 – A second Newton Presbyterian Manor essential health care worker tested positive for COVID-19 after learning a close contact outside work tested positive for the virus. The employee last worked July 27 and passed the pre-shift employee screening. The employee sought testing after learning they were exposed and the test was positive. No additional testing was recommended because the campus was conducting mass testing of residents and employees related to a previously identified exposure.

August 2, 2020 - A Fort Scott Presbyterian Village non-direct resident care employee tested positive for COVID-19 Saturday, August 1. The employee is in isolation and quarantined at home. The employee, who does not work directly with residents, passed employee screening for their shift on July 30 and wore personal protective equipment as recommended by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The employee began to feel ill and sought COVID-19 testing. The campus was notified that the employee was positive for COVID-19 Saturday evening.

The Bourbon County Health Department and the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) Epidemiology Hotline have been notified. Health department guidelines will be followed for quarantining and testing of employees and residents. Through contact tracing, eight campus employees and two residents have been identified as having close contact with the positive employee. The health department recommends placing all 10 people in isolation until testing can be completed later this week, and monitoring them for fever and signs and symptoms for 14 days.

August 1, 2020 - Two additional Aberdeen Village employees have tested positive for COVID-19. The employees are not involved in providing direct resident care. They are in isolation and recuperating at home. The first employee last worked July 23, before attending a family event out of state. The second employee last worked July 30 and passed the employee screening. The second employee, who attended the same family event, was notified during the shift that family members who attended the event had tested positive for COVID-19. The second employee's shift started at 6:30 a.m., and she was alerted about one hour into the shift. The second employee reported to the supervisor and went home. The employees sought COVID-19 testing and we were notified of the positive results July 31.

The Johnson County Health Department and Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) Epidemiology Hotline have been notified, along with all other required federal and state agencies. The Johnson County Health Department did not recommend contact tracing or testing of other employees due to the fact that the first employee had last worked on July 23; the second employee completed only an hour of the shift and had little contact with others; and contract tracing indicated that the exposure came from attendance at the family event out of states. Aberdeen Village conducted contact tracing and identified one employee who had direct contact with the positive employee. The employee is in isolation and will be tested for COVID-19 next week.

July 29, 2020 - An essential health care worker at Newton Presbyterian Manor tested positive this week for COVID-19. The positive test places Presbyterian Manor's reopening plans on hold. The employee, who works in health care, passed employee screening for their shifts July 25 and 26 and wore personal protective equipment as recommended by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The employee began to feel ill on Monday and sought COVID-19 testing on Wednesday, July 29.

The Harvey County Health Department has been notified of the positive test. The health department recommends testing all health care residents and all campus employees for COVID-19. The health department will test residents and employees on Monday, August 3.

July 29, 2020 – Manor of the Plains received word that all residents and employees tested negative for COVID-19 in campus-wide testing conducted July 28 after an essential health care worker tested positive on July 24.

July 27, 2020 - — Clay Center Presbyterian Manor received zero deficiencies on a focused infection control survey conducted by the Kansas Department of Aging and Disability Services (KDADS) July 27.

July 24, 2020 – An essential health care worker at Manor of the Plains who last worked July 23 tested positive for COVID-19. This positive test places the community's reopening plans on hold. The employee, who works in health care, passed the screening when reporting for work and wore personal protective equipment (PPE) as recommended throughout the shift. The employee began experiencing symptoms of COVID-19 and sought testing Friday, July 24. The employee notified human resources of the positive test result Friday evening. The Ford County Health Department has recommended testing the all residents and employees. Testing will be conducted July 28.

July 24, 2020 – Aberdeen Village learned July 24 that a third non-direct resident care employee tested positive for COVID-19. The employee last worked July 13 and passed the employee screening. The employee was next scheduled to work July 20 but did not work. The employee was tested for COVID-19 July 20 and reported a positive result to the community on Friday. The Johnson County Health Department was notified of the positive test. Based on the length of time since the employee last worked, the health department does not recommend additional testing at this time.

July 18, 2020 - A second Aberdeen Village non-direct resident care employee tested positive for COVID-19. The employee and five others were tested July 14 after another employee tested positive for the virus July 12. The employee is in isolation and quarantined at home. The employee last worked July 6 and passed the employee screening. The employee called in sick on July 7, and was removed from the schedule. The other five employees tested negative for COVID-19. The Johnson County Health Department was notified of the positive test. Based on the length of time the employee has been quarantined and the other five employees tested negative, the health department does not recommend additional testing at this time.

July 16, 2020 - Lawrence Presbyterian Manor has zero deficiencies on a focused infection control survey for assisted living conducted July 16. The survey was conducted by its licensing agency, the Kansas Department of Aging and Disability Services (KDADS).

July 15, 2020 – Emporia Presbyterian Manor gets zero deficiencies on an infection control survey for assisted living conducted by the Kansas Department of Aging and Disability Services (KDADS).

July 14, 2020 – Clay Center Presbyterian Manor gets zero deficiencies on a nursing facility focused infection control survey conducted on behalf of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS).

July 12, 2020 – Aberdeen Village notified a non-direct resident care employee tested positive for COVID-19. The employee last worked July 8 and passed employee screening. The employee called in sick on July 9 and was tested for COVID-19 on July 10. Through contact tracing, six employees were identified who had direct contact with the positive employee. They are in quarantine and will be tested for COVID-19. No residents or employees are showing signs or symptoms of COVID-19.

July 9, 2020 – Missouri’s Department of Health and Senior Services releases plan for reopening nursing homes, assisted living and residential care facilities and declared all Missouri communities to be in Phase 1 of reopening.

July 9, 2020 – Aberdeen Heights notified two additional employees test positive for COVID-19 in testing conducted July 7. One employee last worked July 8 and passed employee screening. The employee is a non-essential, non-direct resident care employee. The second employee is an essential direct-resident care employee who last worked on July 8 and passed employee screening. Neither employee is showing signs or symptoms of COVID-19. All residents and employees of The Glen at Aberdeen Heights will be tested again in 7 days.

July 9, 2020 – Wichita Presbyterian Manor notified an essential health care worker tested positive for COVID-19. The employee last worked June 21 and passed the employee screening. The employee was next scheduled to work June 29. The employee called in sick and was advised to get a COVID-19 test. They were tested July 1 and the results were received July 9. The medical community and CDC advise that the incubation period for COVID-19 varies from host-to-host, but that most individuals who get infected and develop symptoms will do so within at least 14 days. Because the employee has not been on campus for 18 days, there is not a risk that the employee transmitted COVID-19 on our campus.

July 8, 2020 – The Ford County Health Department declares the outbreak at Manor of the Plains closed after all residents and employees tested negative for COVID-19 in testing conducted June 30. It was the second round of testing with all negative results.

July 8, 2020 – Wichita Presbyterian Manor Presbyterian Manor gets zero deficiencies on a nursing facility focused infection control survey conducted on behalf of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid

Services (CMS), and zero deficiencies on an adult care home (assisted living) focused infection control survey by the Kansas Department of Aging and Disability Services (KDADS).

July 8, 2020 – Salina Presbyterian Manor gets zero deficiencies on a nursing facility focused infection control survey conducted on behalf of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS).

July 7, 2020 – Aberdeen Heights notified that all results from testing employees and residents of The Glen at Aberdeen Heights on June 29 were negative. Another round of weekly testing is set for July 7. Weekly testing is required until the community has two rounds of testing with all negative results.

July 7, 2020 – Arkansas City Presbyterian Manor gets zero deficiencies on an adult care home (assisted living) focused infection control survey by the Kansas Department of Aging and Disability Services (KDADS).

July 1, 2020 – Lawrence Presbyterian Manor gets zero deficiencies on a nursing facility focused infection control survey conducted on behalf of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS).

June 30, 2020 – Fort Scott Presbyterian Village gets zero deficiencies on an adult care home (assisted living) focused infection control survey by the Kansas Department of Aging and Disability Services (KDADS).

June 30, 2020 – Aberdeen Village gets zero deficiencies on a nursing facility focused infection control survey conducted on behalf of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS).

June 29, 2020 – Arkansas City Presbyterian Manor received good news with the results of campus-wide testing completed last week. All residents—independent living, assisted living, memory care and health care—tested negative for COVID-19. The community tested 212 residents and employees June 25. Employees tested during the campus-wide testing also were negative for COVID-19. Two employees were out of town and will be tested this week. In addition, follow-up testing will be done related to the two previously reported positive tests.

June 28, 2020 – PMMA released a template reopening plan to its communities in Kansas and Missouri to begin planning and working with their local teams on procedures specific to their locations for reopening dining, activities and visitation. Kansas communities were required to submit plans to their local health departments for review. Missouri communities continued to wait for guidance from the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services.

June 24, 2020 – Aberdeen Heights notified of two new COVID-19 positive tests employee testing concluded at the community June 22. One employee last worked June 21 and passed employee screening. The employee is a non-essential, non-direct resident care employee. The second employee is an essential direct-resident care employee who last worked today and also passed employee screening. Neither employee is showing signs or symptoms of COVID-19. Testing and quarantining will be completed in accordance with Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and health department recommendations. Residents who were in direct contact with positive employees will be placed in isolation pending COVID-19 testing results. All Aberdeen Heights employees and residents of The Glen at Aberdeen Heights will be re-tested for COVID-19 June 29.

June 24, 2020 – Manor of the Plains received more good news with the results of a campus-wide retest for COVID-19. The campus learned that 65 residents and 86 employees tested for COVID-19 were negative. Of the employees who previously tested positive, only two are still awaiting a second negative test to be cleared to return to work. To officially close the outbreak at the community, one more round of testing with all negative results is needed. The next test will be June 30. Manor of the Plains also receives zero deficiencies on a nursing facility focused infection control survey conducted on behalf of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS), and a an adult care home focused infection control survey by the Kansas Department of Aging and Disability Services (KDADS).

June 24, 2020 – Topeka Presbyterian Manor gets zero deficiencies on a nursing facility focused infection control survey conducted on behalf of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS).

June 23, 2020 – Topeka Presbyterian Manor gets zero deficiencies on an adult care home (assisted living) focused infection control survey by the Kansas Department of Aging and Disability Services (KDADS).

June 23, 2020 – Arkansas City Presbyterian Manor gets zero deficiencies on a nursing facility focused infection control survey conducted on behalf of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS).

June 23, 2020 – Clay Center Presbyterian Manor notified that 11 employees who had direct contact with COVID-positive resident tested negative for the virus. The resident also was re-tested and is now negative for COVID-19.

June 23, 2020 – Salina Presbyterian Manor notified a non-direct-resident care employee tested positive for COVID-19. The employee last worked June 16 and passed the employee screening. The employee called in to work June 17 and was tested June 18. The Saline County Health Department recommended contact tracing and testing those employees who had direct contact with the COVID-positive employee within 6 feet for 10 minutes or more during the employee's most recent shifts.

June 22, 2020 – Arkansas City Presbyterian Manor notified another non-direct-resident care employee tested positive for COVID-19 in testing the week prior after another employee had tested positive for the virus. The community announced plans to test all residents and employees for COVID-19.

June 21, 2020 – Aberdeen Heights notified two essential direct-resident care employees and one health care resident tested positive for COVID-19 in a second round of campus-wide testing June 19. Another round of testing will be scheduled and employees and residents will quarantine/self-isolate according to recommendations from the St. Louis County Health Department and the campus medical director.

June 19, 2020 – Emporia Presbyterian Manor notified all COVID-19 tests for residents and employees from June 12 were negative. No additional testing was recommended by the Flint Hills Community Health Center. Two positive employees will return to work when released by the health department.

June 17, 2020 – Arkansas City Presbyterian Manor notified an employee tested positive for COVID-19. The employee last worked June 10. The employee was sent home after reporting a potential exposure to a COVID-19 positive person through social contact. The employee was tested on June 15 and results were received June 17. The Cowley County Health Department recommended contact tracing and testing employees who had direct contact with the positive employee. Seven members of the team were tested.

June 17, 2020 – The Kansas Department of Aging and Disability Services releases guidance for assisted living community and home plus reopening.

June 15, 2020 – Aberdeen Heights notified an employee tested June 4 and an agency direct-care provider who began working at The Glen June 15 were positive for COVID-19. The community tested 192 employees June 4. Of those, 121 were negative and 70 tests are still pending. The 79 residents of The Glen at Aberdeen Heights, which includes assisted living, memory care and health care also were tested June 4. Of those, 65 tests were negative and 14 tests are still pending. The resident who tested positive in May has now tested negative twice and is now out of isolation at the community.

June 12, 2020 – Emporia Presbyterian Manor notified a second employee tested positive for COVID-19. The employee was tested during Flint Hills Health Department ordered testing of 37 employees at the campus conducted earlier this week. There are still 25 test results pending. The Flint Hills Health Department notified the community Friday morning and arrived to conduct campus-wide testing early Friday afternoon. The community notified residents and designated family contacts and all required federal, state and local agencies. The health department tested 170 employees and residents.

June 12, 2020 – Clay Center Presbyterian Manor notified all employee and resident COVID-19 tests conducted June 10 were negative. The entire campus will be retested to confirm there was no campus-based transmission.

June 12, 2020 – The Kansas Department of Aging and Disability Services releases guidance for skilled nursing community reopening.

June 10, 2020 – Clay Center Presbyterian Manor notified an assisted living resident tested positive for COVID-19. The resident returned from the hospital on Friday, June 5, and was placed in isolation for 14 days per our re-entry protocol. The resident was tested for COVID-19 after the community learned the resident may have been exposed while off campus. The Clay County Health Department recommended testing of all residents and employees.

June 10, 2020 – Aberdeen Heights gets zero deficiencies on a nursing facility focused infection control survey conducted on behalf of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS).

June 9, 2020 – Manor of the Plains learned all residents in independent living, assisted living and health care tested for COVID-19 were negative for the virus. The community tested 140 employees and residents. One employee tested positive, and 10 employees had to be retested due to issues with their samples at the lab. Re-testing was completed June 9. In addition, the health care resident who previously tested positive had a second consecutive negative test and was released from isolation.

June 4, 2020 – Emporia Presbyterian Manor notified a non-direct resident care employee tested positive for COVID-19. The employee last worked on June 2, and wore a mask and gloves as recommended by the CDC. The Flint Hills Community Health Center recommended testing 37 Presbyterian Manor employees and 2 employees of Morrison, the company that provides dining services. Tests were done the week of June 8.

June 3, 2020 – Parson Presbyterian Manor received zero deficiencies on a nursing facility focused infection control survey conducted on behalf of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS).

June 3, 2020 – A non-essential direct resident contact employee at Aberdeen Heights tested positive for COVID-19. This is the second identified case tied to Aberdeen Heights. The senior living community has identified the employee's contacts in the building and they were tested June 4.

May 30, 2020 – A health care resident living in The Glen at Aberdeen Heights has tested positive for the novel Coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19). The resident was diagnosed with pneumonia and was subsequently tested for COVID-19 at the direction of Dr. Alka Kapoor, Aberdeen Heights' medical director, as part of her standard protocol. The health department recommended June 1 that all Aberdeen Heights employees and residents in The Glen, which includes assisted living, health care and memory support, be tested for COVID-19 this week. Testing was conducted June 4.

May 30, 2020 – The Ford Health Department and the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) Epidemiology Hotline notified Manor of the Plains of another employee who tested positive for COVID-19 Friday, May 30. On June 1, the Ford County Health Department recommended that all residents and employees be tested again. Independent living, assisted living and health care residents be tested with all Manor of the Plains employees. Testing was completed June 5.

May 28, 2020 – Farmington Presbyterian Manor gets zero deficiencies on a nursing facility focused infection control survey conducted on behalf of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS).

May 27, 2020 – On May 26, 9 Manor of the Plains employees were administered rapid COVID-19 tests, and 2 employees tested presumptive positive for the virus. The Ford County Health Department recommended testing all other employees who have not yet been tested and re-test residents in health care for the virus.

May 23, 2020 – Manor of the Plains reported a cluster of COVID-19 infections to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the Ford County Health Department after 1 resident and 1 additional employee tested positive for the virus on May 23. Residents and employees working in health care were tested May 22 after another Manor of the Plains essential health care worker tested positive for COVID-19 due to a close personal contact showing signs and symptoms of the virus. Twenty-nine residents and 43 employees tested negative for the virus. The Health Department considers the three cases to be a cluster. Clusters are defined as two or more non-household COVID-19 cases identified in a certain timeframe and place. The Health Department requested any additional employees who had contact with either the new positive employee or the positive resident be tested. Employees were sent to be rapid tested.

May 20, 2020 – Manor of the Plains was notified a second essential health care employee tested positive for COVID-19. The employee, who works the evening shift in health care, last worked on May 16. The employee was tested for COVID-19 Sunday, May 17 due to a personal contact not affiliated with Manor of the Plains, and the results were received late Wednesday, May 20. Manor of the Plains contacted the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) epidemiology hotline and the Ford County Health Department. The Health Department has recommended testing the 30 residents who had contact with the employee during their last shift, and the 42 employees who had direct contact with the employee during their shifts on May 14 and May 16. Employees and family members were notified of the positive test and the health department recommendations.

May 18, 2020 – The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) releases guidance for states to begin reopening skilled nursing facilities to visitors. The authority to determine how skilled nursing facilities reopen was given to states. CMS also announced plans for focused infection control surveys.

May 7, 2020 – Manor of the Plains was notified an essential health care employee tested positive for COVID-19. The employee last worked April 26. The employee passed the employee screening for their shift April 26, and was not scheduled to work again until May 9. On May 6, the employee was tested for COVID-19 and the results were received May 7. Manor of the Plains contacted the Kansas Department

of Health and Environment (KDHE) epidemiology hotline and notified the state about the positive test. KDHE did not consider the staff member to be infectious during the last shift worked 11 days prior and recommended no further action be taken. Employees and family members were notified of the positive test and KDHE's recommended response.

April 30, 2020 – Newton Presbyterian Manor notified an essential health care employee tested positive for COVID-19. The employee last worked April 21. The employee is in isolation and quarantined at home.

The employee passed the employee screening for their shift April 21, but the employee was sent home during the shift when they started feeling unwell. The employee next reported for work April 23, but did not pass the screening and was sent home. The employee was tested April 24 for COVID-19, and the test was negative. The employee did not return to work. On April 28 when the employee was still not feeling well, the employee was tested a second time, and tested positive for COVID-19.

The Harvey County Health Department advised Newton Presbyterian Manor to monitor residents in health care and memory care and other staff members for five days for any signs or symptoms of respiratory illness and signs of COVID-19.

April 1, 2020 – Aberdeen Heights notified an independent living resident receiving treatment at a local hospital tested positive for COVID-19. The resident had been off-campus since March 25.

The state of Missouri has issued guidance to hospitals and senior living communities to ensure the resident is free of COVID-19 symptoms before the resident can return to the campus.

Independent living residents were notified and were strongly advised to adhere to the no visitor “rule,” and limit the number of medically non-essential appointments, events and gatherings attended off campus.

March 23, 2020 – Parsons Presbyterian Manor notified a non-direct care staff member tested positive for COVID-19 in a neighboring county. The employee had not had a temperature and was not displaying other symptoms of COVID-19.

The community acted swiftly to ensure the safety of residents and other staff members. All residents placed in isolation for the next 14 days. During that time, residents to be checked for fever and other signs and symptoms of COVID-19 at each shift change. Residents were already being checked daily for fever and symptoms of COVID-19. Families and care partners were notified. All staff members are following CDC guidelines and best practices as these are continually updated.

Staff members who had direct contact with the affected staff member were placed on 14-day home quarantine and monitored for symptoms.

March 17, 2020 – Heart and Soul Hospice, a wholly owned service of PMMA, releases statement on protocols in use to ensure health of hospice patients on service and to assure referring agencies that both locations are still accepting new patients.

March 17, 2020 – A COVID-19 information page is added to the Heart & Soul Hospice website based on recommendations by the CDC and the National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization. The website is shared by the two locations. Previously, prevention information had been shared on the hospices' Facebook pages.

March 16, 2020 – PMMA released a new LIMITED ACCESS poster updating the in-person visitor exception to end-of-life situations only per March 13 CMS guidance. Visitor questionnaire updated to include questions about domestic travel.

March 16, 2020 – PMMA released communications to staff about increased access to telehealth through company health plan, whether a participating employee or not, and lifted restrictions on prescription refills for maintenance medications. Separate memo addresses travel and PTO. Employees who travel domestically to places with active COVID-19 cases, on cruise ships or internationally will not be allowed to return to work and will be expected to observe a 14-day quarantine upon return.

March 14, 2020 – PMMA communities discontinue all communal dining and group activities, per CMS guidance on March 13, 2020. Residents educated on principles of social distance (6-feet between individuals at all times), and encouraged to practice the principles in conducting activities of daily life. PMMA communities begin screening all employees and checking for fever before starting a shift.

March 13, 2020 – PMMA moves all communities to LIMITED ACCESS in response to CMS guidance. Community websites are updated to explain LIMITED ACCESS.

March 13, 2020 – PMMA institutes weekly COVID-19 update calls with corporate staff and PMMA community leaders.

March 13, 2020 – PMMA's corporate marketing team meets with community marketers to discuss marketing strategies and tactics for LIMITED ACCESS communities.

March 13, 2020 – First case of COVID-19 is announced in Sedgwick County. Three additional communities in Sedgwick and surrounding counties are added to the LIMITED ACCESS list. Information released later reveals the case is a Butler County man who was tested at a Wichita hospital.

March 12, 2020 – PMMA posts a blog explaining the difference between LIMITED ACCESS and Visitation Discouraged on all PMMA community site blogs and the PMMA blog.

March 10, 2020 – PMMA adopts CMS guidelines released March 9 creating two levels of visitation for senior health care centers. Three communities are placed on LIMITED ACCESS due to confirmed COVID-19 cases in their county or a surrounding county. Under the March 9 recommendations, access was limited except in the cases of end-of-life situations and where the visitor was necessary for the care and wellbeing of the resident. All other PMMA communities are placed on discouraged visitation, meaning visitation was discouraged unless absolutely necessary.

March 9, 2020 – PMMA launches social media communications regarding COVID-19 on all community Facebook pages as well as the PMMA and hospice Facebook pages. Updates continue there throughout the crisis.

March 7, 2020 – COVID-19 information pages are added to all 16 community websites and the corporate website. The same information is provided to charter members at Aberdeen Ridge through a members-only area of the Aberdeen Ridge site the week of March 9.

March 6, 2020 – PMMA distributes a family letter regarding COVID-19 to all of its 16 communities for residents, families, volunteers and guests. Posters warning against visiting campuses if displaying of signs of COVID-19 or having recent international travel are distributed to PMMA communities and hung at entrances prior to weekend visits beginning. Additional COVID-19 resources are sent to communities as well to help teams in efforts to prevent COVID-19 from entering the buildings.

March 6, 2020 – PMMA distributes letter to employees and resources for dealing with illness via PMMA Employee newsletter. The employee letter and resources from CDC also are provided for all PRN and agency staff.

March 3, 2020 – PMMA has first interdisciplinary novel Coronavirus 2019 call with all **of its** communities and corporate staff. Work begins on letters to residents, families and employees and posters for entry doors to all communities.

Mid-January 2020 – PMMA began having dialogue with our teams and communities about the COVID 19 virus. We looked at our infection control practices and policies, reviewed hand hygiene education with staff and residents, and began the process of preparation for this pandemic.

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
