

As the “together games”, Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games has been declared a “Bid from Oceania” by the Australian Prime Minister, Queensland Premier and AOC President. IOC President Thomas Bach claimed that Brisbane 2032 “will be Games for the whole Pacific region”. ONOC President, Dr Robin Mitchell, hailed it “a win for Oceania”, that can bring continent-wide benefits.

Working in close collaboration with all stakeholders and partners, this “Home Games” has the potential to make a tangible mark in long-term human legacy for the entire Oceania region.

The Brisbane 2032 Games are a platform for the Pacific Island nations and the entire region to achieve unprecedented levels of quality performance outcomes and authentically feel a “Home Games” advantage.

Oceania National Olympic Committees (ONOC) is seeking to design and resource a targeted, long-term strategy with world-class leadership and a holistic high-performance environment, culture and programme to ensure optimum success for the Pacific at Brisbane 2032.

With 10 years to the Opening Ceremony, it is an opportune time to take a “Giant Leap Forward” and join us in creating and delivering an ambitious vision, implemented in planned phases.

ONOC is uniquely placed to coordinate the partnership programmes for its Paralympic counterpart, the Oceania Paralympic Committee (OPC). This initiative has the imprimatur of OPC, who is working symbiotically with ONOC.

Working in consultation with all NOCs and sports stakeholders, ONOC will provide a Pacific perspective which is vital to the success of the programme.

The Programme will include and embrace support for all Pacific NOCs through ONOC without exception, solidifying "Pacific Unity" in sports.

The programme will be managed under best practice governance and risk management frameworks, and insightful reporting standards and requirements.

Objective, data-driven and outcome focused Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) will be embedded in the programme, with "hard-hitting" analysis and year-on-year performance progressions, published for accountability and rigorous scrutiny.

### Our Strategic Focus Areas

1. Select and support **priority Olympic and Paralympic sports** tailored to individual country strengths.
2. Develop domestic grassroots programmes to **drive talent identification**, producing a larger pool of quality next generation athletes.
3. Create a **genuine pathway for high potential athletes** that encompasses structured long-term academic and career development, with constant exposure to high-performance training and world-class competitions.
4. **Holistic development of athletes' voice and wellbeing** that acknowledges the person before the athlete and includes a psycho-social perspective, while intentionally building a culture where everyone feels valued.
5. Enhance ONOC's long-standing commitment to **strengthen the capacity and equality of women and girls** in sport through effective advocacy, development and empowerment.
6. **Strengthen and grow the base of Paralympic athletes**, with joint NOC/NPC working relationship that has specialist coaches equipped to train Para Athletes, and access to regular classification and qualification events.
7. Introduce and **develop new sports** on the Olympic and Paralympic Games programmes.
8. Develop a **larger pool of high-performance** coaches with access to performance psychology, game analysis and sport science.
9. Continuous **access to affordable international class training facilities**, resourced with rehabilitation and recovery, and strength and conditioning, to spearhead an effective high-performance Daily Athlete Training Environment (DATE).
10. **Dedicated in-country "Brisbane 2032 Delivery Teams"** characterised with growth mindset, continuous improvement within a "learning organisation" culture.
11. **Strengthen the capability, systems, resourcing and capacity of the Member Federations** of the National Olympic Committees (NOCs) and the National Paralympic Committees (NPCs).
12. Provide a **supportive, safe and enabling environment** with special Visa Class with flexibility to work and/or study, access to para-medical services, caring host family programmes, making the training bases a "home away from home" for overseas-based Athletes and their Coaches.

### LEGACY BENEFITS FOR OUR STRATEGIC PARTNERS

1. Go beyond inspiration and soft diplomacy, by delivering meaningful community engagement with tangible and measurable longer-term results for the Pacific.
2. Build capacity, deliver greater athlete pathways and generate enhanced performance outcomes, with a legacy well beyond 2032.
3. Brisbane 2032 offers the best "one-off" opportunity to create an integrated Olympic / Paralympic athlete sport model in the region, thus extending our capabilities.
4. The two Olympic cycles leading up to the Brisbane 2032, must provide the Pacific Islands with new levels of talent identification and high-performance outcomes with strong Human Legacy that has never been seen before, setting a platform for future sporting systems throughout the Pacific.
5. Help improve partner NOCs and NPCs own performance across several sports.
6. Enhance pathways and build local expertise of coaches, sports scientists and support teams in host nations through systematic knowledge sharing programmes.
7. Promote ongoing commitment to equity, multiculturalism and engagement with the Pacific community.
8. Attract major events ensuring that more Olympic and Paralympic Qualifying events are held in the region which provide direct pathways for continental qualifications for the Oceania region, while promoting the region as a premier sports tourism destination.
9. Incremental multiplier economic benefits derived from sports diplomacy, community engagements, tourism, trade and sustainable human legacy.
