Differentiated or not?

Example 1:

Mr. Smith's class just finished reading *Macbeth*. As a final project, he gives students three choices:

1. Create a list of songs that would fit each scene of the play and explain why they were chosen.
2. Choose one character to analyze and write an essay explaining if he/she is a dynamic or static character.
3. Create a Google Slides presentation that summarizes the plot of the play.

Example 2:

Mr. Billy's class just finished reading *Macbeth*. As a final project, he gives students three choices:

1. Write an essay.
2. Create a Google Slides presentation.
3. Create an audio recording explaining their views.

Whichever format they pick, the topic is *Explain the relationship between Macbeth and Lady Macbeth, and how it changes throughout the play.*

Differentiation by Branching with Google Forms

You can use Google Forms to differentiate your instruction through a branching technique.

This redirects students to different places based on their responses.

I Do

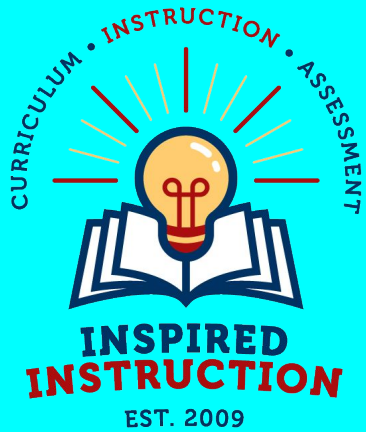
