The Joy of Serving: Serving in Small Ways The Free Clinics

Since December 2001, The Free Clinics (TFC) has provided free care to low-income, uninsured residents of our community. The mission of TFC is to ensure quality healthcare is available to all our neighbors by bridging the gaps in our present healthcare system.

The scope of our problem:

- 10% of the population in Henderson and Polk counties lived in poverty in 2019 according to the US Census, before the current pandemic-driven economic crisis
- 30% of the adults in our two counties live in households with less than \$2,700 in monthly income according to the census, and thus meet TFC's income guidelines of 200% of the Federal Poverty Level.
- 15% of adults ages 18-64 had no health insurance in 2019; this is prior to the persons newly uninsured due to COVID19
- 1 in 6 Henderson and Polk residents - prior to COVID19 - qualified for TFC care because they were both uninsured and earned less than 200% of the Federal Poverty Level

What began just over 19 years ago as a single weekly acute care medical clinic has today evolved into a multi-faceted and integrated care-giving system. This was driven by the recognition that to truly impact the health needs of our community required a holistic approach. Not just acute care, but chronic medical, psychiatric, behavioral/substance abuse, cultural and socioeconomic factors must also be addressed. Services today include:

Acute Care: Medical Clinic

Behavioral Health: Counseling, Detention Center Clinician, Naloxone provision Post Overdose Response Team (PORT), Psychiatric Care Navigation, Psychiatric Clinic

Chronic and Specialty Care: Endocrinology and Eye Clinics as well as Bridges to Health, Community Case Management, Diabetes, and Phoenix (domestic abuse) Programs

Community Health: Bikes 4 Life, Community Garden, Diabetes Education, Flu Shot Clinics, Patient Health Advocacy (Community, Detention Center), Wellness Screening

Pharmaceutical Support: Community Pharmacy, Medi-Find Prescription Assistance Program, and Medical Therapy Management

TFC volunteers and staff provided 48,611 encounters to 2,207 unduplicated patients last year (July 2019 – June 2020), 85% of whom survive on less than \$1000 a month. In addition, they made 192 referrals to specialists who generously provided free services, and arranged 37

surgical procedures and 514 diagnostic tests. In addition 15,723 prescriptions were filled through the Community Pharmacy, including 2,103 through the Medi-Find Prescription Assistance Program.

The Free Clinics is the most economical healthcare available in Henderson and Polk counties. The value of the professional services given through TFC in 2019-2020 was over \$10.2 million. With an annual budget of \$1.73 million, TFC was able to multiply the value of each dollar received more than seven and a half times in the value of care provided.

There is a jazz version of the hymn, “Just a Closer Walk with Thee”, that I really enjoy listening to. This hymn expresses the longing of my heart; maybe yours too. Sing it with me...



Just a closer walk with thee, grant it, Jesus, is my plea; daily walking close to thee, let it be, dear Lord, let it be.

I am weak but thou art strong: Jesus, keep me from all wrong; I'll be satisfied as long as I walk, let me walk close to thee.

Through this world of toil and snares, if I falter, Lord, who cares? Who with me my burdens shares? None but thee, dear Lord, none but thee.

When my feeble life is o'er, time for me will be no more; guide me gently, safely o'er to thy kingdom shore, to thy shore.

We are now well into the season of Lent. This Lenten season addresses the longing of our heart to have a closer walk with Jesus. At our Ash Wednesday service we heard this invitation to Lent that welcomes us to embark on this closer walk with Jesus.

But our sinful rebellion separates us from God, our neighbors, and creation, so that we do not enjoy the life our creator intended.

As disciples of Jesus, we are called to a discipline that contends against evil and resists whatever leads us away from love of God and neighbor. I invite you, therefore, to the disciplines of Lent – self-examination and repentance, prayer and fasting, sacrificial giving and works of love – strengthened by the gifts of word and sacrament. Let us continue our journey through these forty days to the great Three Days of Jesus' death and resurrection.

The disciplines of Lent guide us in this closer walk with Jesus. Through them we are drawn to the heart of Jesus. I am enjoying time each morning to sit with God, to share my concerns, to read devotions and prayers, and to hear the assurance that I am loved by God and called by God

to be a part of the kingdom of Jesus in the world. This is one of the daily practices/disciplines that bring me to a closer walk with Jesus.

I recently read the book, *Letters by a Modern Mystic* by Frank C. Laubach. In this book Laubach writes about his journey of walking closer to God. He strives to have each moment be in communion with God. He describes in this book his development of this communion with God. He finds great comfort in sharing each moment of life with God.

This season of Lent invites us to practice daily and even moment by moment communion with God. It is a great blessing to us to address our longing for this closer walk with Jesus. So keep on practicing. Keep on with the disciplines of Lent. Keep on walking closer to Jesus, satisfying the longing of your heart.

Prayers for the Healing of the Nations

Thursday, March 25, 6-7 p.m.

During the season of Lent we will be offering one of our very meaningful and most popular services of worship: Prayers for the Healing of the Nations. This service comes from the Holden Village Community, a Lutheran retreat center in the isolated North Cascade mountains of Washington State. One of the hallmarks of Holden Village is worship which is centered on prayer and often reflects the "Taizé-like" worship in France and the Iona Community in Scotland. The most well-known, popular and beautiful services to come from the Holden Community is the Holden Evening Prayer service which we have offered at Grace during the seasons of Lent and Advent for over 20 years, and will offer again during the upcoming season of Lent.

Many of the prayer services at Holden Village involve the singing of simple musical refrains and chants, and focal points, such as art work, maps and crosses. Scripture and other texts are read and prayers are prayed. A large (16' by 16') map of the world, itself a beautiful work of art, will be the focal point of our worship service, along with our processional cross and torches at the "4 corners of the earth". Toward the end of the service a song naming many of the nations of the world will be sung, and votive candles will be placed on map as we pray for the nations of the earth. At the end the room will be lit only by candle light.

The map was created by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America Global Mission Unity and is on loan to us for this service. This will be the third time we have offered this service, and the fifth time we have used maps for services of contemplative worship at Grace.

**A Message from Vicki Marthaler,
Serving as President of the WELCA at Grace Lutheran**

Dear People of God,

This March message comes to you as we are deep in the season of Lent. Lent – a time of renewed discipline to be in the Word and a time to reflect on the God Moments in your life. God Moments are those times that God in His grace reveals Himself to us in amazingly nourishing ways...a moment of crystal clear clarity, an overwhelming sense of complete and total peace, a frozen moment in time that jump starts faith, an awakening of being made new with Jesus by your side. God Moments are unexplainable, yet real. God Moments are gifts from our Heavenly Father. And, it is my firm belief that God Moments are meant to be shared that others may be encouraged and strengthened in their faith journey. Sharing a God Moment is one way to evangelize, to tell of Jesus and His love.

Evangelism. Hmmm. Being a strong Norwegian Lutheran, I have personally kept evangelizing at arm's length. It seems a rather risky business. I have basic Biblical knowledge with the emphasis on "basic." I don't want to embarrass God (or myself, probably more emphasis on myself) if someone stumps me with a Biblical question. And there are those questions like: Why does God let babies die? Why do bad things happen to good people? Then there's the authority of the Bible and science v. religion and hypocrites going to church and all the church ever asks for is money. Yeah, evangelism can open up a whole can of worms!

Yet, aren't we called to be "fishers of people?" Worms are a part of the fishing experience, but worms aren't the goal. The worms are used to make the "catch." And what is the "catch?" I propose to you the catch is "souls for Jesus." So with that in mind, I would like to share with you one of the many God Moments in my life.



It's December, 1982. I am in the Israel with others from my church. We have just held a service where we read the end of Matthew when our Risen Lord and Savior, while ascending into heaven, commanded the disciples and those in attendance to *"Go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And, surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."* I was very moved and

quite overwhelmed and returned early to our bus to reflect. The view from the bus was Jerusalem. The Eastern Wall with its blocked-up gate was in view with the expanse of the city sprawling beyond. I started to think about all who have not heard of God's love demonstrated in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. I thought about all who have heard and didn't believe. I then thought of Jesus seeing Jerusalem and saying *"Jerusalem, Jerusalem, you who kill the prophets and stone those sent to you, how often I have longed to gather your children together, as a hen gathers her chicks under her wings and you were not willing..."* (Luke 13:34) What broke over me can only be described as a cascade of tears. I began to cry... no, sob. From deep inside, those who were lost, living in darkness, defeated, fooled, empty or seeking to fill themselves with whatever the world could give them, bombarded my soul and I sobbed for them. I cried and cried feeling the deception of Satan who longs to dissuade a believer, distract a seeker, confuse a mind and use apathy and/or arrogance in strong measure to deflect any call of the Spirit. I remember crying to God *"Why can't they see? Why won't they believe?"* I don't remember an answer but I do remember the bus driver watching me in his mirror. I tried to calm myself. I wanted to "buck up," but the tears just wouldn't stop. The

heaviness on my heart was so real. One of the pastors traveling with us came up the bus steps and saw my melt down. He looked at the bus driver with that "what happened?" look. I heard the bus driver say "She's OK. She is just having a God Moment."

And as I began to sniff and snuff myself quiet. As I blew my nose and wiped my eyes... as the sobs subsided to whimpers.... as I felt like I had aged another thirty years, I also felt that nudge of the Spirit on my heart bringing the kind of peace that can't be described and in my mind I heard "I need you. I need your tears. I need your heart. I love you and I am always with you." A God Moment.



I would like to say that I became an effective, bon-a-fide, first-rate evangelist following that experience. But, as I stated before, I am Norwegian Lutheran – full blooded. It will take a little more than one God Moment to move me along. Yet, I am moving. I am sharing. I am a work in progress. And Jesus is with me and for me as He is with you and for you.

Evangelism. Go to everywhere. Tell the Good News. Share your God Moments that the Lord Jesus may be made known and glorified, especially during this unsettled time of the pandemic and the general world/nation unrest. It is important to hear that Jesus is with us. Jesus is an abiding Savior and Lord. Jesus keeps His promises. Jesus is real and present, now and forever.



The Women of Grace invite you to hear God Moments as shared by 18 women of Grace, so far, on our YouTube playlist, **Gathering Grace**. The purpose of each episode is to share God Moments as a way of refreshing the hearts of believers and inviting all to grow in faith and give thanks to God for the God Moments in their lives. Every person has their own story and tells of their God Moment in their own way. Following is a list of the episodes through the month of February.
