Lent is a time of learning. Lent is a time of prayer.

In the Ash Wednesday Gospel lesson, Jesus invites us into a deeper practice of prayer. Throughout the forty days of Lent, many resolve to expand their prayer life, but lose focus over time. Lent may be a time of prayer, but is also a time for learning. Thus, our commitment to prayer can be stronger, if we first take the time to learn a few spiritual practices.

This year our midweek Lenten journey will celebrate and experience five types of prayer, which can be practiced individually and communally:

- Walking Prayer (March 9)
- Morning & Evening Prayer (March 16)
- Prayers around the Cross (March 23)
- Healing Prayer (March 30)
- Centering Prayer (April 6)

Our classroom will rotate between Stull Hall and the Sanctuary. Our three pastors will be our teachers. Each week will provide a time of learning and a time of practice. The evening begins with a simple supper in Stull Hall, 4:45-5:30 p.m. Worship and teaching follow, 5:45-6:45 p.m.

# Message from Pastor Christina Auch

Return to the LORD, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing. – Joel 2:13

I was once asked to describe God in one word and the word I chose is "steadfast." Knowing that nothing I can do will change God's love and grace for me or send God screaming for the hills and forsaking me steadies me in a world that can be fickle and unpredictable. Trusting that God is ever-present and desires to be a relationship with me and for me to find belonging and make my home with God invites me into deeper life with God.

I did not grow up in church. I was christened as an infant in the Episcopal Church and attended when my father, a career Navy officer, was home from deployments. A Navy family, we moved often between the two coasts, settling in northern Virginia eventually. I returned to the Church as a college student, and when our daughters were small, we began worshiping at our neighborhood church, an ELCA Lutheran congregation several blocks away. I experienced pastors who were loving human beings with their own gifts and challenges and found community in the relationships with others in the congregation. A few years later I was invited into ministry by my pastor and began learning more about congregation leadership and what ministry outside the church walls looks like. It was during this time that I was called into full-time ministry and began candidacy with the NC Synod and seminary.

Since 2007 my family has been in Arden where my husband Jamie teaches and coaches at Christ School, an all-boys Episcopal boarding school. When I received my first call to Shelby in 2014, we figured out how to live in different zip codes much of the time and became empty nesters as our daughters left for college and boarding school. Jamie remained at Christ School and I lived in Shelby where I led a small congregation as a full-time solo pastor for seven and a half years and also worked part-time as a hospital chaplain for the last two years.

We delight in our daughters and watching their adventures out in the world. Casey is now 26 and living in Boston where she is a graduate student studying transportation planning at Tufts and an intern for Massachusetts DOT. Emma is 22 this month and a senior at Western Carolina where she studies forensic chemistry and criminal justice and serves on her sorority executive council.

We also find great joy in our four-legged companions. We have three dogs and two cats which, frankly, can be a lot sometimes! But they're sweet and we love to head into the woods on Christ School's campus with them for walks.

Throughout the years of school and ministry and personal ups and downs, that include breast cancer in 2018 and the deaths of my father and Jamie's mother in 2019 and 2021, God has remained steadfast and loving, gracious and merciful, and always present for us.

I am so grateful for God's leading me into this new season of ministry with you all here at Grace and hopeful for what will unfold during our time together.

#### ELCA Youth Ministry Extravaganza

In February Jill and Anne Marie attended a weekend of continuing education at the annual ELCA Youth Ministry Network Conference. Thank you Grace family for making experiences like this possible: for staff to connect with colleagues and learn! Jill's conference track was "Reimagining Children's Ministry" and Anne Marie's track focus was "Mental Health in Ministry." We both found this time of listening and learning to be a meaningful experience and even though our tracks were different we found some similarities for renewed hope where is God calling us.

#### **Boundless Lament**



This winter our Grace students have experienced the cancellation, loss, and grief of two important faith formation focused experiences: the annual Lutheran Youth Organization conference by the NC Synod and the 2022 Minneapolis Youth Gathering by the ELCA. While it is difficult to convey the sense of frustration and all that is lost by the cancelation of these irreplaceable faith journey pieces, without an alternative plan provided from the NC Synod or ELCA, our students have communicated that they still would like to have something for them. Instead of the February LYO, Grace Youth Ministry will participate in a

fun fellowship weekend together with Boundless bible study material and service project at a cabin in the Smoky Mountains. Our students have worked hard all year to prepare for the ELCA Youth Gathering, and currently we are starting back at square one researching options to fill this week in July for those participants. Thank you, Grace family, for your continued support as we pivot to provide what is possible for youth faith formation experiences. During a recent grieving processing meeting called "Boundless Lament" students/guides picked a prayer while sharing their feelings about the cancellations.

Prayer: "May I have the vision to see this day and the work that comes with it as a gift." 12 grader reflection: "Although the news of the gathering canceling has come as a disappointment, I feel lucky knowing I will be continually supported by this church. I feel lucky knowing that although we won't be able to go to Minneapolis this summer, we will be able to serve somewhere else in some other capacity. Out of this disappointment has come many possibilities, which wouldn't be without it, so I see it as an unusual and somewhat confusing gift."

Prayer: "May I have the courage to expect good for my life and world, and resilience if and when those expectations are disappointed. "

12<sup>th</sup> grader reflection: "While yes, it is disappointing that, yet another thing is canceled, it is important to stay strong and not let it throw you off track. You can't let one bump in the road throw you out of the car. Right now, it feels a little like rolling with the punches, but that is the new normal. Things can only go up when you're at the bottom. Therefore, you must be resilient and to just keep living."

#### Prayer: May I believe that newness is possible.

11<sup>th</sup> grader reflection: "I am feeling bummed out that the Gathering got canceled. But I think we can find a trip that can be just as fun or maybe even more fun. This prayer speaks to me by giving me hope that we can move on to better trips and help more people in need."

Prayer: May I learn to make good out of what I'm given. Rather than only make sense of it. 8<sup>th</sup> grader reflection: "I honestly feel I've been let down. I have never been anywhere further from the south, and I feel stuck. So going to the Gathering in the north and meeting other people who could be like me would have been an escape."

Prayer: May I never grow tired of starting over or helping others do the same. My hope is always in renewal and resurrection. May love be stronger in me than the fear of the pain that comes with caring.

Adult Guide reflection: "The level of emotional exhaustion is staggering. I definitely have to rely on God and close relationships right now, so I don't just throw my hands up and quit being hopeful. Trying to feel encouraged by resilience shown by the youth but so tired of having to be disappointed over and over again. But I'm not ready to give up trying, caring, or being hopeful."

Who would choose to go to Minneapolis Minnesota in February? Anne and I! We packed up our Cuddle Duds and headed north for the ELCA Youth Ministry Network "Extravaganza", a four day youth ministry conference that was attended by about 700 in-person and 300 online participants. Extravaganza is an annual event which gives youth ministers a place to "experience spiritual renewal, continuing education and opportunities to network and connect."

I decided to participate in the "Reimagining Children's Ministry" led by Dr. Dave Csinos. Dr. Csinos has published several books on children's ministry, but his latest "Little Theologians: Children, Culture and the Making of Theological Meaning" was the focus of the workshop I attended. One of the first things Dr. Csinos had us do was to fill in the following blank, "The purpose of Children's Ministry is \_\_\_\_\_\_" I am still working on a full answer, but here are some thoughts.

- 1. To show children that they are an integral part of the body of Christ.
- 2. To equip families with the tools they need to create a church in miniature in their daily lives.
- 3. To create a church culture that encourages space for all ages to share their theological ideas.

The world is constantly changing and how we as a church view faith formation for children needs to change as well. It has only been 24 hours since I returned from the conference, so I plan to give myself a little time to think about how I want to implement a "reimagining" of Grace's ministry to children and families. #### Johann Sebastian Bach 1685-1750

Bach has done much to enrich the worship life of the church. He drew on the Lutheran tradition of chorale (hymn) singing and wrote around 200 cantatas (multi movement for choirs, soloists and orchestras), including at least two for each Sunday and festival day in the Lutheran calendar of his day. He has been called the "fifth evangelist" for the ways he proclaimed the gospel through his music. He was born into a musical family on March 31, 1685 in Eisenach, Germany. After serving as composer and director in several German churches in towns, he became the Cantor of St. Thomas Church in Leipzig. From 1723 until just before his death, he composed, rehearsed and

presented his massive number of cantatas, as well as such large scale works as the St. Matthew Passion and the Christmas Oratorio. He also wrote numerous works for organ, solo instruments



and for orchestras. Bach's grave is by the altar of St. Thomas Church.

On Sunday, April 3 we will use Bach's music in our 9 a.m. Tradition worship service. We will be joined by the Café String Quartet who will accompany the choir and will play several instrumental works from Bach's cantatas. This will be a festive Sunday in which we honor the greatest composer in our Lutheran heritage, and one of the greatest composers in all of western music.

## LENTEN THOUGHTS BY PRESIDENT OF THE GRACE WELCA UNIT, VICKI MARTHALER

How has your new year, 2022, been so far? I have to confess that this new year has already been challenging for me!

On Jan. 1, I tested positive for Covid. So there's that. I spent my quarantine week taking two naps a day and feeling like I had a bad head cold. I recovered and am ready again to take on the new year.

On Feb. 2 I was walking my 9-month-old exuberant, strong half German Shepherd/half Husky grandpuppy, Hank. Hank caught me off guard which resulted in me taking a tumble onto the pavement where I bumped my head (ouch!), banged my shoulder (uffda!), twisted my wrist (owie!) and scraped both knees (yikes!) Julia Hockenberry talks of a young teen from the club who she called Tasha, and who she had asked to volunteer with her in her office doing some cleaning and window washing. As Tasha worked, Julia talked to her and saw how excited she was to have been chosen to do these projects. She beamed as Julia complimented her on the job well done. But Julia also knew the story of very difficult years in her home life prior to joining the club. In the club Tasha was seen as just another teen and she could fit in and be comfortable, supported and accepted. This is a small example of how the club can affect one child.

But this year the club had 847 members. The children enjoy their time at the club, and how many of them have similar needs to Tasha. The club is there to help.

As a wonderful added club impact, 97% of the parent's report that the club services help them to keep their jobs supporting their families. It is a wonderful place for children to learn and grow.
