You will want to choose a college that has an employment

rate of 90 to 95 per cent. This means, almost all students find work in their chosen field after completing their studies. The employment rate is a definitive sign that the quality of education in a supportive environment is excellent and worthy of your time and money.



6. Security



It is an unfortunate reality that emergency situations can strike at any time. The health safety of students, faculty and staff is a primary concern at your Career College. Safety initiatives, emergency preparedness and crisis planning should be front and centre.

It begins with background checks on staff and instructors. Checking the references and past history of employees is becoming standard practice in most industries and serves as a backup to information captured during the hiring process. There should be a high level of compliance to complete these checks.

Other students in specific programs, such as legal studies and health care programs may be subject to a background or reference check. These checks can be to ensure future employability of students after graduation, but is also a best practice to further ensure the safety of other students and staff at your Career College.

As part of a sound emergency plan, staff and faculty members with First Aid and CPR Training are identified.

Career Colleges may also offer free CPR training for those who would like to learn this skill, proven to save lives in the event of accident or illness.

7. Accreditation

One of prospective student's primary responsibilities is to fully research the feasibility of their chosen profession and program options.

It is important for students to gather information about post-secondary education and be aware of their rights and responsibilities to make an informed decision regarding the training required to help them achieve their career goals.

It is always wise to examine the accreditation of a prospective Career College. Accreditation is a distinction granted to institutions by the province which meet or exceed the stated criteria of education standards and quality.

To meet these standards, a prospective Career College should offer: A high-quality curriculum, high-standard campus facilities and educational resources, credit transfer options, financial aid and profes-

sional success.

All Canadian provinces and territories have their own regulatory bodies which grant licences and provide accreditation to private institutions, keeping them accountable.

It is up to each employer or post-secondary institution to decide whether to recognize programs offered by private institutions.

You should ask specific employers and post-secondary institutions if they recognize the Career College and its program(s) you are investigating.

Once you have successfully completed all program requirements and have paid all fees in full, the institution is required to provide you with credentials.

- Assures consistency in institutional activities
- Provides public accountability
- Assesses and enhances the educational standards of an institution
- Promotes institutional development in terms of education quality and facilities

This is necessary if the profession you have chosen requires licensing, such as health care workers. In other words, license to apply your new knowledge and skills in a successful career with higher earnings.

8. Accessibility and Flexible Schedules

Deciding on an exciting new career and taking the first step towards it is exciting. You don't want anything to get in your way. Many traditional schools may not have immediate openings and even waiting lists.

College website is often your first point of contact.


Course options, funding and admission procedures should be clearly listed with an easy to locate 'Contact Us' page and contact form for letting the Career College know you want

The value of a career program should not be over-stated. Over promising and under delivering is dangerous. Ask for statistics on post-graduation career prospects so that you can make an informed decision.



Program descriptions and expectations should be accurate and explained fully. Course work, assignment expectations

and grade benchmarks should be clearly stated. A clear and definitive picture of what careers are available post-graduation should be provided with data to back it up.

With smaller classes come fewer interruptions and more meaningful conversations. Instructors have opportunity to adjust the curriculum to the needs of their students, providing opportunity to go deeper into the subject material.

It is far easier for students to pay attention when the classrooms are smaller. Student engagement is higher, and instructors are better able to identify students who may not fully understand the subject at hand,

An average student-to-teacher ratio should be 10 TO 1 OR LESS.

giving them ample opportunity to help them catch up.

Feedback is essential to the learning process at your Career College. Students in a smaller classroom can expect a more thorough assessment of their participation in class, and of

their assignments.

In turn, students can better acquaint themselves with their classmates. Learning and sharing with a peer group will reinforce information provided by instructors and further support the learning process. Each student's contributions are important and should be acknowledged. The support of other students and understanding from peers acts as a safety net. Spending time with students, not only in the smaller classroom but a smaller campus at your Career College, with foster a sense of community so essential to the success of so many students.
