# Reducing Bias in De-escalation of Emergency Department Patients

Preliminary data suggests that Black and Hispanic patients are physically restrained significantly more often in emergency departments compared to white or non-Hispanic patients. The recipients of the Spark Grants for Health Equity will design and implement a study protocol to meticulously assess and document how current provider practices and inherent biases may play a significant role in the more frequent use of force against these marginalized communities.

### These simulations will be held in the month of April!

Our goal is to reduce bias in staff members' perceptions of threats and safety risks regarding agitated patients, specifically regarding agitated patients of color. We are delivering targeted simulation-based training to ED providers to reduce bias during de-escalation of agitated patients and decrease use of restraints to use verbally and behavioral interventions to de-escalate patients. Our training program will give clinicians the tools to provide more equitable care while maintaining a safe environment for all patients and providers.

We have had a great response so far! Due to limited capacity, we won't be able to accommodate everyone in the next two sessions but given the interest hope to have more in the future.

### Patient Education and Community Engagement around Cerebral Vascular Accident in Roxbury and Dorchester

Black Americans are at greater risk for stroke than any other race and are more likely to have a stroke at a younger age, die from stroke, and have more post-stroke disability. Compared to other races, Black Americans are even more likely to delay seeking care when having a stroke. This delay can be catastrophic, as early treatment can mean the difference between making a full recovery versus severe disability and even death. Patient education is one of many keys to helping black communities reduce death and disability due to stroke, a condition that kills 1 out of every 5 Americans.

The Spark Grant recipients for Social Justice propose a public health and patient education campaign in the majority black neighborhoods of Roxbury and Dorchester to educate local citizens on the importance of seeking immediate care for stroke. Through a video series, mail flyers, community outreach and a digital hub of information, project lead Mariama Runcie, MD, and collaborators hope to educate black communities to recognize the signs of stroke and seek immediate care at nearby medical facilities. This sincere effort also aims to restore Black Americans' faith in a medical system that has traditionally underserved them, underscoring that they are welcome and deserving of state-of-the-art care.
