


Chana Senesh was born on July 17, 1921 in Hungary. Her father, Béla, a journalist and playwright, died when Hannah was six years old. She continued to live with her mother, Kathrine, and her brother, György (also known as Giora or George).

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


Chana felt an urgent need to enlist in the struggle against Nazi Germany.


She volunteered for the British Army and was selected for one of the most dangerous secret initiatives: parachuting into Nazi-occupied Europe to gather intelligence and help save Jews. In March 1944, Chana and her comrades landed in Yugoslavia and crossed the border into Hungary.

The last letter that Chana Senesh would ever send.



It had been about two months since Chana parachuted. She sat down to write to her brother, writing in English since all letters were required to go through the British army censor before they were sent on to their intended recipients. If she had written in Hungarian, it would have taken longer to translate and get approved. Chana wanted to be sure the letter would be quickly delivered to her brother.

Chana wrote “A Walk to Caesarea” in 1942, describing a walk from her kibbutz, Sdot Yam, to nearby Caesarea. In 1945, the words were set to music by Israeli musician David Zehavi. The song is also known as “Eli, Eli” and has become an integral part of Israeli culture. It is sung on Holocaust Memorial Day (Yom Ha’Shoah) ceremonies throughout Israel and in Jewish communities around the world.
