
Great Books to Read with Your Preschooler




<u>Bear is Awake: An Alphabet Story</u> by Hannah E. Harrison

So begins an unlikely friendship and an unexpected adventure as the girl attempts to figure out what a bear is supposed to be doing in the winter. (Hint- It's not eating pancakes or visiting the library!)

Bedtime for Sweet Creatures by Nikki Grimes

It's bedtime. But Mommy's little one is not sleepy. He growls like a bear, he questions like an owl, he tosses his mane like a lion. He hunts for water like a sly wolf and hides like a snake. Mommy needs to wrangle her sweet creature in bed so that the whole family can sleep. From tigers to squirrels to snakes, the little boy dodges around his bedtime, until he is tired enough to finally sleep. His imaginative animal friends weave their way through the illustrations, eventually joining him in curling up for the night.






<u>Brown Bear, Brown Bear, What Do You See?</u> by Bill Martin


<u>Do Unto Otters: A Book About Manners</u> by Laurie Keller




Hair Love by Matthew A. Cherry




I Will be Fierce! by Bea Birdsong




<u>Press Here</u> by Herve Tullet







Rosie Revere, Engineer by Andrea Beaty

When her great-great-aunt Rose (Rosie the Riveter) comes for a visit and mentions her one unfinished goal, to fly, Rosie sets to work building a contraption to make her aunt's dream come true. But when her contraption doesn't fly but rather hovers for a moment and then crashes, Rosie deems the invention a failure. On the contrary, Aunt Rose insists that Rosie's contraption was a raging success: you can only truly fail, she explains, if you quit.

Skippyjon Jones: Class Action by Judith Byron Schachner

Once inside his closet, he finds himself on the playground of his imagination, surrounded by dogs of all kinds.
