Apsley Hotel opens today

Today marks a new beginning for the Apsley Hotel, with the doors being opened on a new venture for Ganesh Sadhain who moved to Walcha recently.

A chef from Nepal, Ganesh has been living and working in Australia for the past six and a half years in restaurants in Sydney and Port Macquarie. Prior to that Ganesh owned a restaurant in Nepal which was completely destroyed in the earthquake early in 2015, with his wife suggesting they move to Australia to start afresh following the destruction.

He will operate the bar and restaurant at the Apsley Hotel, with the food having an exciting Nepalese influence. "Some examples on our menu will be dumplings (Momo in Nepalese), chicken wings with a buffalo sauce or whisky maple sauce, samosas, and a Nepalese chicken pie. For those who prefer Australian cuisine, you can tempt your tastebuds with pork ribs, chicken schnitzel, fish and chips, a caesar salad and a coconut poached chicken salad," Ganesh said.

In Napalese culture food is prepared fresh for every meal rather than freezing. "This is still how I cook today, and we won't be serving frozen food in the restaurant, and will prepare everything fresh," he said.

Ganesh is encouraging families to enjoy a night out, with children under 10 years eating for free from Monday to Thursday. Kids will be able to enjoy fish

and chips, chicken nuggets or bolognese.

For those with a sweet tooth, Ganesh will vary the desserts depending on what is fresh at the market, starting off with a creme brulee, churros and a chocolate pudding cake.

"It will be a varied menu, with different specials every day," he said. The restaurant will be open for lunch and dinner seven days per week, with the whole menu being dine-in and takeaway. "We will have 5-6 meals available for weekday lunches under \$16," he said.

In addition to the bar and restaurant, Ganesh has opened up more rooms for accommodation at the Hotel, which now features ten rooms. "There are also lockers available for bikers to securely lock away their bikes, and all bookings will include free breakfast," he said.

The bar will feature all of your favourite beverages, with cigarettes also for sale. And the pool table will be popular, with the pool comp only \$3 to enter with the winner taking the pot of money.

Ganesh is looking forward to catering for Christmas parties with the function room also available. "I can also cater for takeaway functions," Ganesh commented. He is also looking for experienced bar staff.

around the traps

November was forecast to be wetter than usual. They got that right! I did a quick reco of the latest rainfall tables on the BOM website and there are a lot of districts with well above 200mm for the month and a few at 300 plus. Gunnedah has recorded 304mm for November, parts of the Hunter are closer to 400mm, Orange has recorded 317mm while plenty of stations around the state have recorded between 200 and 300mm for the month. My records at home add up to 227mm for the month, following a couple of fairly moderate months when we were actually thinking a fall of rain would be welcome! Without a lot more rain in December it appears we will head into the new year with a number somewhere north of 1000mm for 2021, which is certainly one of the best. What an amazing finish to the year.

As much as we are saying we will never say "we don't want any more rain right now", I think there would be some people in the cropping game who are at least thinking along those lines. You have to feel so much sympathy for those people who, after a number of years without a crop, are suffering enormous losses from this recent deluge. More rain is forecast in the northwest this week which, if it eventuates will not help those wanting to be on the harvester. Another feature of this situation which must be really biting hard is the sheer volume of grain sitting in wet paddocks that was so close to being in the bag. They are absolute bumper crops! The worst of the damage seems to be in the Gunnedah to Moree area, but there are a lot of crops elsewhere which will be written down in value due to weather damage. In the central west they are telling me they think they will still be harvesting at Christmas unless there is a dramatic change in conditions. This is a tough finish to a great cropping year and no doubt a bitter pill to swallow.

Inflows into the major water storages around the state are at record levels. I was told this week that water is flowing into Burrendong dam at the rate of around 160 megalitres per day. That is an amazing number, but when you are also told that Burrendong is currently sitting at 146% full and outflows have been less the 30 megalitres per day, you don't have to be a genius to work out that if there is suddenly a lot more rainfall in the catchment, the situation could escalate very quickly to something of a disaster. There are still a surprising number of storages below 100% with Windamere Dam at Mudgee still only 39%, Split Rock Dam is 69% and Glenbawn 77% (after all the rain that has fallen in the Hunter!). Flooding is creating havoc in many districts along the northern and central NSW river systems. It will be interesting to watch any developments along the Macquarie River as outflows from Burrendong are increased. The marshes may get very wet!

Just when you think that cattle values cannot get any stronger, it appears the rain from the last couple of weeks has really whet the appetites of restockers to fill paddocks, almost regardless of the cost. Just watching results on AuctionsPlus over the last few weeks, I think you could have bought some lines of cattle in early November and sold them last week and taken a significant margin. The average price of PTIC heifers rose week on week by a staggering \$450 on AuctionsPlus last week, which may be a reflection on quality as much as quantity, but there is no denying that was the recorded rise over a week. Light heifer values increased by \$203 per head, while the medium weights rose by \$260 per head. Averages for station mated cows with CAF rose by \$361 week on week, selling to a top of \$4770 for commercial cows. Interestingly, steer values remained firm, but no dearer. The EYCI has hit 1,111 this week which is another high point we never thought would be reached in this cycle. I think there is some consensus around the season and what affect it will have on values in the medium term. Most seem to think values will be bound together with the season and if the BOM are right about a wetter than average summer, that will stick with producers for some time to come.

Lamb values have been a little more volatile this week as numbers impact on prices. Southern numbers have been running at seasonal highs and prices have become erratic as a result. This last week we have seen prices ease by as much as \$20 for many classes of lambs, resulting in numbers easing in many of the big centres. Mutton values generally have remained firm to slightly dearer as numbers have remained steady. It will be interesting to follow the numbers as we head into 2022 and with that will be values.

Posties back in town this Friday

Last Friday it was the roar and hum of road and adventure bikes cruising around town, but this Friday it will be the sound of 30 Honda Postie Bikes and their support crew making their way into Walcha.

Once again the Lake Macquarie based fund raising group Posties with a Purpose, have included Walcha as one of the towns on what will be their fourth charity ride. Having stayed at Gingers Creek on their '2012 Byron Bay' ride and in Walcha for their '2019 Lunatic Loop', the boys will be back in town as part of their three day, 1000km round trip 'Delivering for Amber'. They will tackle tar, gravel back roads and dirt tracks on a journey, starting and finishing in the beachside suburb of Dudley and take them through places such as Booral, Bunyah, Nowendoc, Kookaburra, Willawarrin, Taylors Arm, Wauchope, Wingham and Bulahdelah.

Anthony McNamara has lead the 'Postie Pack' from day one, with the inaugural ride in 2007 coming about after his daughter needed vital medical care and numerous surgeries. While the first three rides raised funds for the John Hunter Hospital's Children's Ward, the fourth has become very personal with the riders coming together to support one of their own. Amber Hughes, the 16 year old daughter of one of the riders Stu, was recently diagnosed with Diffuse Intrinsic Pontine Glioma (DIPG), one of the deadliest of childhood cancer – brainstem cancer.


While Amber and her family – parents Stu and Trish, and siblings Ty and Rachael – are faced with difficult daily decisions in regards to her treatment, their families along with their large network of friends have rallied to raise funds for both research and Amber's

potential inclusion in clinical trials early next year. Their aim is to do all they can for Amber and in-turn help find therapies for all children who are diagnosed with what is currently an incurable childhood cancer.

Posties with a Purpose began raising funds for their 'Delivering for Amber' ride in mid October and have just surpassed \$113,000, making this their largest fundraiser to date. Anthony said they have been overwhelmed with the response. Their first order of 500 stubby holders sold out in a week so they have had to order more, and they have had over 630 people donate to their page. They have also had great support from many generous businesses, including Lowes Petroleum who have donated all of the fuel required for the bikes and support vehicles to make the 1,000km journey.

If all goes to plan the riders have estimated they will arrive in Walcha between 4.00 and 5.00pm this Friday 3 December. They will be heading straight to the New England Hotel for well earned refreshments and a good nights sleep before they head off on Saturday morning for Day 2 of their ride. While Anthony is a little concerned about the weather and how the recent rains may impact their ride, he is hoping they can stick to their planned route.

So, if you see the guys make sure you give them a wave. It has been great to see the high level of interest in the upcoming elections and the referendum question regarding wards for Walcha Council. There has been a lot of information shared and some of that needs to be corrected.

Referendum – Who decides

On the 30/6/2021, Council debated and voted on the referendum question. The outcome of that vote was that all except one Councillor voted for the referendum. That vote was purely to pass the question to the community in order for you to have your say. It was not a vote on whether Councillors themselves wanted to retain or remove wards. Only one Councillor thought the community should not have an opportunity to decide. Six Councillors strongly believe that Walcha voters have the right to decide. That is democracy.

Candidates for Council and Wards – who do they represent?

Walcha Council needs the eight best people in the chamber and the ward system can often hinder this process. Communication and the functions of Council have changed drastically since the Ward based system was introduced. It is not longer serves its purpose.

Under the current ward system, if only 2 candidates stand in a ward they are automatically elected. In this election half of Walcha's voters, those in wards A and C have no input into who are the elected members of the council. A positive of not having wards is that all voters get to have a say on all Councillors, and as long as there are more than 8 candidates no one gets automatically elected.

A major flaw of the current ward system is that a councillor does not have to stand in the ward in which they live. In this last term of Walcha Council only 4 of the 8 Councillors lived in their wards. In this election there are two candidates who do not live in the ward they are standing for. If the reason that wards are vital is to represent the constituents of each ward evenly across the whole of the council area, this raises a serious question for a Councillor not living in the ward they were voted to represent. Most decisions of Council are not ward based but those that are, for example major rural road work, would leave you asking which ward a Councillor would support - the one they live in or the one they were elected in? If they act in a manner that represents the ward they live in rather than the ward they were voted in to represent, it effectively gives one ward three representatives and another only one.

Ward Boundaries

Recent comments about who establishes ward boundaries presented incorrect information. If the community choose to retain wards, under section 210, 210a, 210b and 211 of the Local Government Act wards must not vary in voting numbers by greater than 10%. The statement last week was that the Electoral Commission tells us where the ward boundaries will be, this is incorrect. The Electoral Commission does not tell us where the Ward boundaries are. Council must redraw the lines, put it out for public comment before then notifying the NSW Electoral Commission. Just like we as a community will choose whether to retain or abolish the ward system, we as a community also choose the boundaries should wards be retained. This follows what is done at both at Federal and State level and ensures that every voter has an equal representation. It is the very reason that Walcha Council is moving from the Tamworth to the Northern Tablelands electorate at the next State election.

Put simply, Walcha Council will benefit greatly from removing wards and having all voters have their say on all Councillors. That is a fairer democracy.

Without going into great depths, as that has already been done by other contributors to this column, it dismays me that we have had councillors who have filled this important role for many years and without ever facing an election.

In short, you could have 4 crackers stand in one ward and 2 not so cracking in another ward, and you will get the 2 non-cracking candidates and miss out on 2 crackers. It is well and truly time to Vote YES to abolish Wards.

Garden Club Clippings

Recent wet conditions have provided the ideal situation for fungal diseases to proliferate in our gardens. Here are few suggestions that may help ease the situation. Clear away any diseased leaf debris from the plant including at ground level. Dispose by placing in a black plastic bag and leave in the sun to kill the spores fungal present or incinerate. Clean your pruning tools and hands between plants otherwise you will spread the disease further around the garden. Air flow between plants is essential so give your plants space. In a wet year such as the one we are currently experiencing this is particularly important as plant growth has been exceptional and overcrowding is occurring. Choose plants and seedlings which have disease resistant traits and look strong and healthy. Another key factor is not to over fertilise your plants during time. This causes plants to increase their uptake of moisture and therefor transpiration of the plant is increased. In turn, the plant is creating its own humid environment for fungal diseases to thrive in. Use over the counter recommended sprays or alternatively an organic spray. Alternate your fungal spray so plants do not create any resistance. Here is an organic spray recipe to try. Place 4.5 litres of cold water in a bucket then add one tablespoon of baking soda and ½ teaspoon of lux soap flakes or finely grated sunlight soap. Stir to dissolve thoroughly. Spray plants early in the morning and let the solution dry before the heat of the day to avoid leaf burn. Ensure you spray both sides of the leaves and the ground below to kill any fungal spores. Repeat weekly until the problem has resolved. As always, early detection and intervention goes a long way to reducing the problem.

Now is the time to tidy up your bearded iris plants after they have finished flowering. Dead head iris flowers and clear away any old or untidy looking leaves. Iris plants are very susceptible to thrips so have a close look to see if small white insects are flying about when the plants are disturbed. Spray with insecticidal spray to bring them under control. Iris plants can be divided once the soil is starting to cool in early autumn. It is recommended that plants be divided every 3-4 years.

In the vegetable patch it is time to finish planting summer squash, sweet corn, eggplants, cucumbers and tomatoes. Most vegetables are having a slow start this year due to the rain, cloudy and cooler than usual days. Pollination will be difficult as bees have not been active throughout the past few weeks. Gardeners may need to play a hand in pollinating their crops to ensure any form of success. Plant sweet corn closely so the wind can assist with pollination. Introduce blue flowering plants such as borage, heartsease, rosemary to encourage bees into the vegetable garden.
