

Walcha Council shared in \$38 million of funding announced last week by Member for New England, Barnaby Joyce from the National Bushfire Recovery Fund.

The big winner was Walcha Aerodrome which will have \$1.61 million spent on upgrading the access road and facilities to ensure it remains a key base for the NSW Rural Fire Service (NSWRFS) for local aerial fire fighting.

As the Aerodrome is also regularly used by the Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF) for high altitude training of C130 Hercules air crews in the use of unsealed airstrips, the upgrading of the airstrip as a part of this project will also enable the crews to continue this training.

The \$1.61 million funding will enable Council to:

Strengthen and seal the existing road access, Aerodrome Road, from the Oxley Highway to the Aerodrome, providing safe all weather access

- Extend adjoining powerlines to provide reliable electricity supply to the Aerodrome, and the NSWRFS aerial fire fighting base in particular
- Regravel the existing main runway to support continuing use by NSWRFS and RAAF operations

The upgrade to our Aerodrome will support future commercial operations at this facility, with economic growth potential for our community. "It was important that we funded projects based on need and merit and which offered a lasting and tangible impact, tailored to local needs and conditions," Member for New England, Barnaby Joyce said.

Council also received \$88,261 from the National Bushfire Recovery Fund to enhance the water infrastructure at Nowendoc Hall to assist with bushfire safety and preparedness.

Yarrowitch Public Hall and Recreation Reserve received \$76.644 for Improved Emergency Response Support and community facilities.

around the traps

Without wanting to be Hanrahan, there are some parts of the district and indeed the state that are really in need of rain. In the last couple of weeks there have been occasional forecasts of possible rainfall or storms in our district and they have yielded very little. The BOM had us down with an 80% chance of some rain on Monday with a possibility of as much as 13mm. The result was more than disappointing with nothing received. The eastern fall has had some good rain though, with falls well above the old inch over the last few days and it appears there is more to come. Storms are forecast just about every day for the coming week, so hopefully our circumstances will change.

While the eastern fall has been very wet, the top of the range and western fall has had an average start to the year. We can only hope that the rainfall keeps coming and we do not revert back to one of those dry autumns. February has seen the usual amount of cropping activity locally, with a lot of farmers planting fodder crops, while others are planting longer term pastures. Soil moisture is still quite good but getting through the dry surface has been a challenge for some. In my view we are only a couple of decent falls of rain from a great start to autumn, but that much short of a dry one as well. As crazy as it sounds, I think we need rain badly to keep the season on an even keel.

The sheep and lamb market has taken a sudden turn for the worst this week with prices in early week trading much cheaper in the south. Bendigo reported a yarding of 16,100 sheep and lambs on Monday which is not a big number. However, two processors were absent from the sale and a lack of demand led to lamb prices from \$10 to \$25 cheaper, while mutton was quoted \$15 to \$30 cheaper. These are significant numbers and point to the volatility being created by COVID and logistics. According to the report most lamb prices were in a range from 700 c/kg to 800 c/kg CW with export lambs affected most, the way I read it. Dubbo yarded 19,500 sheep and lambs on Monday with similar trends and price outcomes on a dressed weight basis. Prices were quoted \$7 to \$10 cheaper, but carcass prices finished at similar rates to those in Bendigo. Tamworth yarded 4,800 sheep and lambs which from reports was a fairly plain quality yarding. Market trends were also cheaper throughout.

While there is not a lot wrong with lamb prices in the 700 c/kg to 800 c/ kg carcass weight range, it is a hard pill to swallow when we keep getting told how strong the demand for sheep and lambs is. It is going to be a difficult time through autumn selling lambs if you can't get space to kill them and the processors don't answer their phones. This is happening now and before the numbers spike! I am not really sure why, but it is hard to get lambs booked in to be processed and our options are so limited in the north of the state. With the Australian flock numbers on the rise and more pressure on processing space, graziers are going to have to be very focused on when their stock will be ready, having space booked well in advance of that time. The other aspect of this is that a 45kg LW lamb is now considered a store lamb, possibly even a 50kg lamb is seen in that light. So, in my view if you want to fatten lambs to be processed, you will need to get them to 55kg LW as a minimum to get the best competition, and we all know how hard that can be in New England. The good news is, there is increasing competition in the feeder space for lambs, but they too have a preference for weight. Most feedlots have supply contracts and need continuity of supply. This market is developing rapidly and it will possibly lead to a similar situation as the cattle market, where there are breeders, back grounders and feedlots. It will be interesting to watch this over the next few years, but my guess is many breeders in New England will turn to higher ewe numbers and selling lambs as weaners.

The cattle job has held together over the last week with saleyard prices firm. The appetite from feeders and back grounders for cattle is amazing and that space continues to drive prices. I noticed a report of the recent Ballarat Steer sale on Beef Central where 5454 steers were yarded and grossed over \$13m. The sale averages were wonderful with 500 to 600 kg LW steers averaging 528 c/kg, 360 to 500 kg steers averaging 601 c/kg and 280 to 360 kg steers averaging 828 c/kg. Apparently it was very hard to find steers under 320kg which does point to the magnificent season being had in the south. A significant number of the steers found their way into feedlots in northern NSW and southern QLD and that highlights how light numbers are in the north.

Katrina shines at Zone

At last years Walcha Show, Katrina Campbell was announced the winner of the local Showgirl competition. This competition has recently been renamed the NSW Young Woman Competition to reflect the importance of the competition along with its evolution.

On the weekend Katrina represented Walcha at the combined Zone 4 and 13 finals in Wee Waa. The judges praised Katrina on her knowledge and passion of rural and community affairs and were captivated by her enthusiasm to educate the younger generation about the huge role that agriculture plays in society.

"Pipped at the post by Walgett and Tamworth, we couldn't be more proud of how Katrina handled herself and represented our community" organiser Pip Monie said.

Pharmacy no longer accepting knitting

The Guardian Angel Knitting Program is no longer operating in 2022.

"The COVID 19 pandemic saw us postponing the donation of knitted garments for the 2020 campaign. This meant that the 2021 campaign saw an influx of knitted donations. Continuous lockdowns forced many of the St Vincent de Paul retail outlets to close throughout 2021, creating a backlog of stock that still needs to be distributed and sold. Vinnies do not have the capacity to hold another year of stock from our program," organisers said.

Kings Pharmacy will not be able to accept any knitted garments this year and the program won't operate in the future as it has in the past.

The Guardian Angel Knitting for Good program has been operating for 22 years now, but will no longer continue in years to come. "We are however, introducing new changes to the program this year which will allow people to give back to the community through exciting year round activities," organisers said.

Supporting small business through Omicron

Small businesses who experienced downturn over summer can now apply for a NSW Government support payment of up to \$5,000 per week through Service NSW.

Member for Tamworth Kevin Anderson encouraged businesses with reduced cash flow to apply for the Small Business Support Program so that they could ensure they get through this tough period and keep people in jobs.

Mr Anderson said businesses who had previously applied for support would be familiar with the process and that the Service NSW Business Concierge team and grant assessors were ready to assist.

"Eligible businesses can expect to see payments within 10 days after submitting their application which means they'll received a much needed cash boost as soon as possible."

The Small Business Support Program will provide targeted support to businesses with an annual turnover of between \$75,000 and \$50 million that experienced a decline in turnover of at least 40 per cent in January 2022 and the start of February 2022.

Payments will cover up to 20 per cent of weekly payroll, to a maximum of \$5,000 per week. Eligible non-employing businesses, such as sole traders, will receive \$500 per week.

Funds can be used to cover business expenses such as wages, rent, loss of perishable goods, professional services and other costs.

Applications can be made online through the Service NSW MyAccount, by visiting a local service centre or by calling 13 77 88.

Since 1986 the Colleen Cross Memorial golf trophy has been competed for on 35 occasions, 32 times as a 4BBB and three as an individual event. From next Sunday mum will be joined by dad when the inaugural Colleen and I.J. Cross Memorial Trophy is played for under a medley round.

Husband and wife Greg and Dianne Partridge were the first winners after they posted a very good score of 50 stableford points only equalled or bettered on five other occasions. In 1989 the late David Anderson teamed up with Lynne Watts to record the highest total of 56 points whereas Miles Archdale and wife Janelle are next best on 53 points in 2000.

The other duos to have registered 50 points are Roger Jamieson and Margaret Davidson in 1990, Glenn Death and his mother Rhonda in 1991 along with David Sweeney and his wife Simone in 1997.
