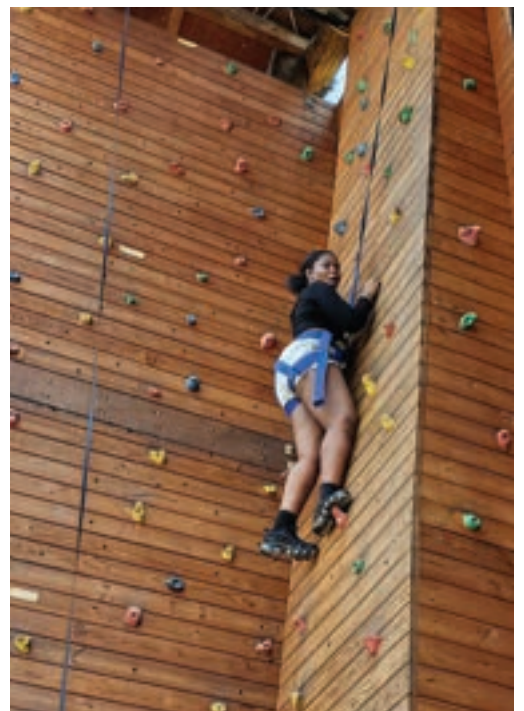
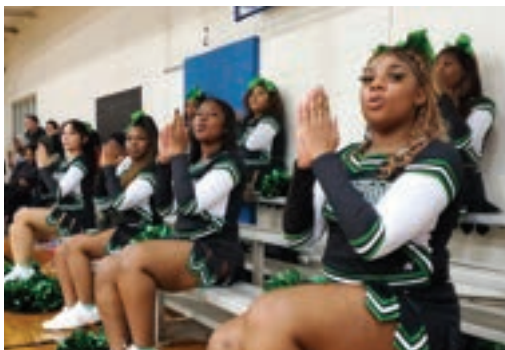

In August 2022, the Winston-Salem Street School began its 19th year of providing students a second chance for a high school education. As is true every school year, we were excited and nervous about what lay ahead. In 2022–2023 we worked with a record number of students in our high school and adult programs. In addition, we had more students coming to the Street School directly

from middle school. Along with these opportunities and challenges, we knew we would need more funding to keep up with the growth of the organization. As we prepare to conclude the school year and celebrate the achievements of nearly 30 graduates, I am pleased to announce that we did it! Thanks to all of you who believe in our mission and support the Street School, our program is stronger than ever.

Letter From Our Master of Social Work Intern



If we believe in divine intervention, we fully understand God orders our steps. I, too, honestly declare most sincere gratitude for the opportunity of invested time with the dynamic group of compassionate and resilient individuals at the Winston-Salem Street School.

I was allowed the opportunity to achieve academic credit, build relationships, coordinate community resources, assist students with social interaction skills, and promote well-being. The students enrolled in this program have secured a place in a competitive environment tailored to meet academic, physical, and emotional needs.

As WSSS's first Social Work Intern, I was eager but unsure of what to expect serving a new role in an alternative school setting with teenagers. Despite the uncertainties, zero reservations prepared me for the task.

It did not take long to realize the difference between this population and most students who walked away from the traditional setting unable to adequately meet or address their needs. As the world continues to evolve, young people have increasingly more pressure to conform, which is complicated and undesirable for many.

The Street School allows students an opportunity to get back on track academically, excel in life skills, ask questions in small environments with time and space to evaluate true comprehension with freedom to express themselves. Graduation results, career paths, increased self-discipline, and self-esteem continue to increase with individuals enrolled in the high school and adult programs.

When prompted to take a deeper look into our personal lives absent of labels predicted by our environments, strengths, and weaknesses, the truth lies that we all thrive by the importance of human relationships, a social work core value. We have all faced rejection, isolation, and anxiety, which many continue to deal with daily. We are better together than we are alone. I was tasked with reaching students where they were, addressing their nonadaptive behaviors, and illustrating the importance of acceptance of self

and others with coping skills to promote mindful well-being. Each student possesses unique characteristics, some built around various undesirable situations; nevertheless, they persevere with steps to reach their goals. I am thankful for the students who trusted me with their stories, ambitions, joy, and tears. Their exceptional traits, along with the inspiration and empowerment provided at the Street School, help guide them to set and achieve dreams that once seemed unimaginable.

The WSSS administration is dedicated to providing a dynamic multi-purpose academic setting to stimulate the minds of their students. The faculty and staff each hold various years of demonstrating true purpose to enrich and create environments for diverse learning. The numerous volunteers joyously provide their time and support through speaking engagements to interject new and stimulating life paths. Club members who value connections and affiliation bring enrichment and awareness. Professionals and tutors with advanced knowledge share their gifts, along with lunch hosts and food pantry volunteers to ensure everyone is provided the essential element required to stimulate the mind. Additionally, parents and guardians who are perceptive, realizing their child has the potential to succeed if granted an alternative chance to learn and grow, will soon join to celebrate a monumental anniversary of success and achievement.

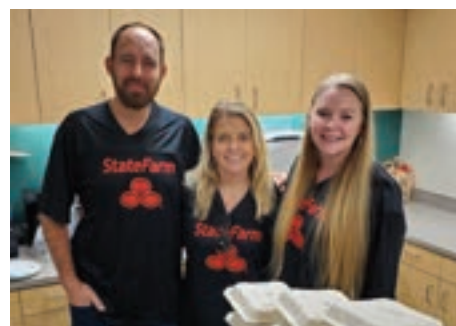

Volunteer Spotlight . . . Student Choice Food Pantry!



In October 2017, our generous friends at Centenary United Methodist Church initiated a program to supply our students with food to take home to their families. Since then, they have provided thousands of meals and snacks to Street School families.

In the beginning, volunteers “double bagged” nonperishable groceries meant to supplement weekend meals at home for Street School families. Students could simply grab a bag on their way out and were basically guaranteed they were getting a meal for four people. The bags always included extra items and it was a very popular program.

Fast forward to the fall of 2021. We noticed student participation had declined. We started dismantling bags and placing the items on some out of the way shelves. We encouraged students to take what they wanted or needed home with them. We noticed the

shelf supplies gradually diminishing and our wonderful volunteers, Holly Lee and Magan Smith, agreed that we had “morphed” into a Student Choice Food Pantry.

Centenary United Methodist Church funds the pantry, while Magan and Holly stock the shelves. Kate May is their Centenary liaison. These women ask Mike Foster to send a photograph of the shelves and shop accordingly. They are very enthusiastic when they relate stories of shopping trips. If you know either of them, please ask. They now bring grab-and-go items for our students running to catch the city bus: fresh fruit, bread, and peanut butter and jelly. The upper shelves have teen friendly servings of fruit, oatmeal, noodles, and Pop-Tarts®, etc. Lower shelves have chili, meat sauce, pasta, vegetables, and tuna. Students from our adult program often stop by and take some groceries home after grabbing a lunch “to-go” box; that is several free meals in one stop.

Our students share not only gratitude but also empathy with these volunteers. Holly appreciates the empathy she saw in a student who asked if it was okay to take food home to a neighbor in need. Magan mentioned that a current student “warmed her heart” by sharing how thankful she is to be at the Street School.

The Student Choice Food Pantry is such an incredible example of meeting our students where they are on their journey towards graduation. We appreciate all our supporters who help support the Street School mission; thank you!

Tutors Impact Our Students as Well



Pat Healy, Adult Program General Tutor: Pat feels that it is a privilege to work with these students. They are motivated and talented, and many have impediments or barriers that have hindered their academic success. The Street School helps these students work through these challenges. Ana and Tammy are very involved, getting to know these students and trying to support them as they navigate their education and adult life demands. Pat is pleased with the technology the Street School has to offer students as well as Miss Ana’s methods of motivation; an “attaboy” gift card at the end of a tricky unit.



Mary Lawrence Currie, High School Math Class Tutor: Mary Lawrence volunteers and says a top tutoring day is “any day we are laughing and learning.” Each student works at their own level, so it is hard for the teacher to teach material to the whole class. An extra person in the room allows a student to have individual attention. Mary Lawrence always leaves feeling like she may have made a small difference. They might not use two-step equations in their daily life but helping them know how to solve them gets them closer to meeting their math qualifications for graduation. Mary Lawrence’s favorite thing about tutoring is getting a chance to spend time with a student encouraging them to learn a new skill. “I also love the opportunity to spend time

with teenagers these days! It gives me insight into the issues kids are facing today. The time commitment for tutoring is small but it has the potential to make a huge difference. Everyone at WSSS is there for one purpose only—to help the kids succeed. That is clear in the way the teachers and the staff interact with everyone from the students to the volunteers.”

A Teacher's Perspective

In my six years of teaching at the Street School, I have witnessed tremendous growth and opportunities for the students. I began teaching in August 2017 as a recent graduate from Winston-Salem State University. When I first entered the school, I was warmly embraced by the staff, administrators, and students.

As a former youth counselor, teaching just seemed to fit my career path. I instantly fell in love with the unique design of the school as it catered to individuality, character building, and education. Our location in downtown Winston-Salem has given us more opportunities to explore education outside of the classroom. From scavenger hunts to study sessions at the Central Library, my goal for my students is to connect the community with the classroom.

Many of the students have experienced adult lives before they have fully navigated through their teenage years. This puts most of them at a disadvantage socially and emotionally. But the Street School's 12:1 ratio allows the teachers and staff to build meaningful relationships with the students.

Once there is a connection, I have found that I am able to see the heart as well as the student. That is the moment when all the "hard work" starts to pay off.

Graduate Spotlight – Class of 2023

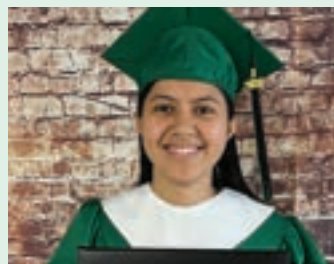


LESLIE

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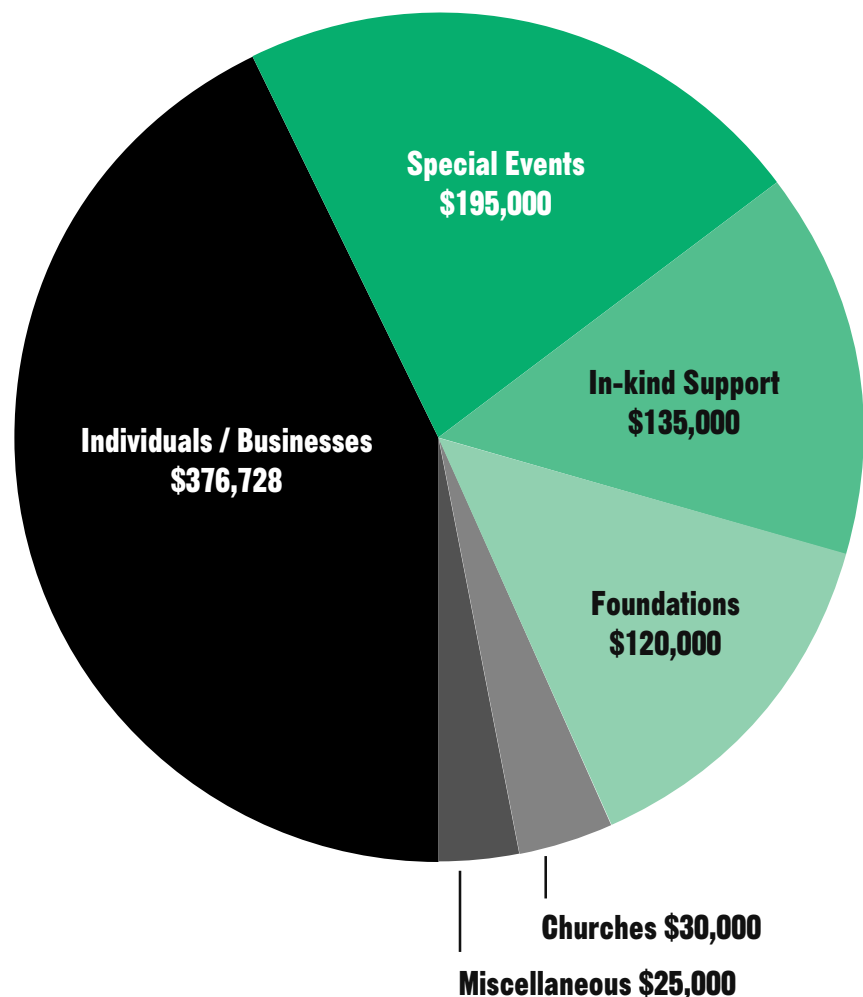
