

Understanding DEMAND

As a Wild Rice Electric Cooperative member, you may have heard us reference the "demand response program," or maybe you've seen headlines that read something like "Nation will continue to see increasing electric demand." But when it comes to electricity – what is DEMAND, really?

Demand is essentially the measurement of the maximum amount of electricity that is being used at one time. You could use the same amount of electricity as your neighbor on any given day, but if you are using most of that electricity during one hour after work, your DEMAND is higher than your neighbor's.



Emily's demand is much lower than Ben's even though their total energy use is the same.

Wild Rice Electric Cooperative has the capacity to power all of its members' homes and businesses during high-demand times of day — usually 6-9 a.m. and 5-8 p.m. However, that high-demand electricity is provided to the co-op at a higher cost.

If members are mindful of spreading out their electricity-based tasks, it can help the cooperative save on high-demand charges. As a member, that savings is passed to you in the form of stable electricity rates and a more reliable, balanced electric grid.

The Wild Rice Electric Trust

board met on Tuesday, May 9th, and awarded nine Operation Roundup grants in the amount of \$35,873 to community nonprofits and educational organizations. The Wild Rice Electric Trust receives money primar-

ily from two sources: 1) from our members volunteering to "round up" their electric bills; and 2) from unclaimed capital credit checks that have been unclaimed for seven years with the last known address to be in the state of Minnesota. The enrollment forms for rounding up your bill and the applications for applying for Operation Roundup grants can be found on our website, wildriceelectric.com or call our office at 1-800-244-5709.

Three area emergency service providers were given Operation Roundup grants:

• Callaway Fire Department: \$10,000 to aid in the construction and installation of a medical helicopter landing pad and access road;



- Mahnomen Volunteer Fire Dept.(above): \$2,950 to aid in the purchase of personal protection equipment and tools;
- **Norman County K-9 Unit:** \$7,500 to aid in the purchase and training of a K9 for the sheriff's department.

A grant was given to promote quick access to life saving equipment:

• **Norman County Agricultural Society:** \$2,540 to aid in the purchase of an AED for the Norman County fairgrounds area.

Several area communities received Operation Roundup grants that will help support community events:

- Mahnomen Co-Agricultural Society: \$1,125 to aid in the purchase of arena and chute banners/signage for local rodeos;
- **Norman County East School:** \$8,000 to help with the purchase of new tables for the cafeteria;
- **Twin Valley Riders Club:** \$758 to aid in the purchase of a Polaris timing console and related equipment.

The following organizations received funds focused on our area youth programs:

- Mahnomen/Waubun Youth Wrestling: \$2,000 to aid in the purchase of new wresting gear;
- Win-E-Mac Baseball: \$1,000 to aid in the replacement of concrete and installation of netting for the batting cage.
