Massive congratulations to our Year 7 footballers, who after an unbeaten Calderdale League run of 4 wins and 1 draw, have been crowned as Calderdale League Champions for the 2021/22 season.

An absolutely monumental season for our footballers so far. Our next target is to win the 'Calderdale Double' by claiming the Calderdale cup in the New Year!

# Year 10 - West Yorkshire Cup Winners: 2021/22

30<sup>th</sup> November 2021: After being denied the opportunity of victory in the 2020 West Yorkshire Cup Final due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Lightcliffe Academy Year 10 footballers finally got their hands on the trophy for the first time in our schools' history, after a thoroughly deserved 3-1 victory over Colne Valley High School of Huddersfield.

Prior to the West Yorkshire Cup Final, the Year 10 footballers had so far maintained an 11-game winning streak in what had been the most dominant footballing displays delivered from a Lightcliffe Academy team in our schools' tenure.



On our way to the West Yorkshire Cup final our Yr10 team brushed aside Farnley (2-0), Spen Valley (7-1) and Wetherby (4-1).

However, within 5 mins of the final whistle, we were extraordinarily 1-0 down which was the first time the Yr10's have been behind in a game since January 2020!

In typically determined and resilient fashion, this minor setback barely fazed our players, as we equalised immediately from the restart with a fantastic solo goal from one of the outstanding performers on the evening, Thom.

With a surge of momentum and desire to take a 2-1 gained from the first goal, we did just that when Charlie pounced onto a shot which was saved by the Colne Valley goalkeeper to slot the ball home into an empty net.

Charlie then tried an audacious lobbed shot from around 30-yards when he spotted the Colne Valley keeper in an unnatural position in his own 18-yard box, but the shot was eventually superbly saved.

At half-time, the first substitution was required when goalkeeper Noah had to be replaced due to concussion and nausea, and his replacement, Lewis, was absolutely instrumental in preserving our slender 1 goal advantage.

After an uncharacteristic, critical half-time rallying cry from Mr Worsnop, the Lightcliffe Academy players responded magnificently. The players took on board minor adjustments and from the first to the final whistle of the second half, it was a typically dominant footballing masterclass.

Fantastic composure whilst defending our goal and being confident in building attacks from defence was demonstrated by our stalwart back-line, particularly Jacob and Lewis who were arguably men-of-the-match on the night.

Without failure, Alex and Josh were influential in the defensive midfield partnership and ultimately their strength and resilience to regain and maintain possession was simply too much for the Colne Valley midfield to compete with.

Ultimately it was 'game, set and match' with 5 mins to play when Jacob 'Terminator' played a delightfully weighted 40yd pass over the Colne Valley back-line onto the path of a determined Charlie who nudged the ball beyond an oncoming Colne Valley goalkeeper, and sealed the deal with a 3-1 victory.

Alongside this, the Yr10 boys were crowned Calderdale League Champions only 5 days prior to the West Yorkshire Cup Final after winning all 4 games and conceding a mere 4 goals, scoring an exemplary 29 in the process.

League fixtures concluded with the following wins: 5-0 vs Rastrick, 7-3 vs Brooksbank, 7-1 vs Brighouse, 10-0 vs Trinity.

Additionally, we have reached the 6th round of the English Schools National Cup for only the 2<sup>nd</sup> time in our schools' history, where a tie vs Wales High School, Sheffield, awaits. This means we are now in the final 30 teams in the entire competition from an initial 904 teams who entered back in September 2021. It also means we are the only team in West Yorkshire remaining in the competition.

An amazing season could also see the Yr10 footballers lift their third piece of silverware in the New Year when the Calderdale Cup final knockout competition begins. A competition we certainly expect to be winning based on what has been achieved so far this academic year.

Our school and local community are immensely proud of what these boys have achieved so far this year, and we're certain that more silverware and accolades will be achieved by the end of the football season in Spring 2022. And who knows . . . dare we dream about National Cup glory???

Year 11 Geography students visited Liverpool in October to look at the impact of regeneration. We had a washout on the first day however students were resilient and still managed to find the best places for lunch! The second day we had better weather, so the students were able to enjoy Albert Dock and Liverpool ONE. It was a great trip which will support students in their Geography

exams in the summer term.

A Year 11 student said the

following; "We had a great day out in Liverpool completing Geography research. We first looked around Albert Docks exploring its history and how regeneration has had a positive effect on a once derelict area. We then went to the museum of Liverpool to gain an understanding of how migration has affected Liverpool. Finally, we explored the Liverpool one shopping centre to see how urban regeneration can have such a large effect on areas".

Year 7 Geography students have been completing school fieldwork to find the best place to have a nature area. They visited 3 areas in school and have written a report to Mrs Wood-Ives to inform her where we should have the nature area. The year 7's have been very enthusiastic when completing the research and they loved walking around school with their clipboards.



# Mentoring





#### Student Working Groups

This half term our students have been applying to join our student working groups. The working groups will lead on projects across the academy over the next few months. The groups are:-

Service - Year 10 mentors. These students will be mentoring some Year 8 students. This will include year 8 students reading to their mentors on a weekly basis.

Health and Happiness - Mental Well being ambassadors. Students will be working towards the Carnegie Mental Health award with the support of Mrs Rathmell and Mr Clarke.

Resilience - Sustainability. Mrs Fuller will be supporting students to lead on projects across the academy to support our aim to become an Eco Friendly school.

Equity - Developing a tolerant, unprejudiced, unbiased community. Students will be working with Mr Cross on projects to ensure all our school members are part of an unprejudiced community.

Dignity - Anti bullying ambassadors. Our students will be taking part in training from the Princess Diana Trust in January where we will be the host school for the training of 150 anti-bullying ambassadors from a range of secondary schools across our region.

All groups have had their first meeting and it is exciting to see what projects students will take on in the Academy and the impact their will have.

# **Black History Month**

October was Black History Month and we explored the importance of this through our shared value of 'equity'. Assemblies, form time and an element of every lesson was based around an aspect of Black History.

### **School Council**

It has been amazing to hold our year and school council meetings again this year. The councils have been

brilliant in supporting the Christmas hampers project but also having a voice on aspects of school life, including the dignity project which will be commencing in January.





It has also been wonderful to see our Year 11 Principal students and prefects taking on their role this term. They have been involved with lunch time duties, Open Evening and the Poppy appeal. It is an excellent opportunity for them all to widen their experiences in support of their application to Post 16 colleges/ apprenticeships next year.


# **Year 7 and 8 Sport Education**




# **Endeavour Programme**

# Message from the Chair of Governors

Dear Parents and Carers

I am writing on behalf of the governing body to thank you for your continued support for Lightcliffe Academy during the past year, during what has been another exceptionally challenging and difficult period for the school, and, of course for you and your families. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank Ms Wood-Ives and all of the staff who work at Lightcliffe for everything they have done to keep the school open, enable students to stay safe, and provide as positive a learning environment as they can.

You will be aware that academy continues to receive regular monitoring visits from Ofsted. The most recent (November) was very encouraging in terms of the progress being made in curriculum development and teaching and learning. However, there are still concerns about the behaviour of a minority of students, the homophobic attitudes among some students, and ways in which the school can ensure all students feel safe everywhere in school, all of the time. School leaders are already addressing these concerns as a matter of urgency.

An area of concern that emerged from the Ofsted parent survey was that not all parents find communication with the academy straightforward and satisfactory. I have already discussed this with school leaders, and we are actively looking at ways to improve this, both in terms of enabling parents to feel confident that they can get a swift response when they contact the academy, and also to ensure that parents and the wider community receive fuller information about what is going on at Lightcliffe, so much of which is really positive, exciting and worthy of celebration!

I would like to have an opportunity to meet with parents in the New Year to get a fuller sense of how we can support better two-way communication.

In the meantime, best wishes to you and your families for Christmas and New Year.
