The State of Minnesota has high wiring standards, which are in the best interest of you and your family or business. Improper wiring can damage your home, your property and equipment, and injure or kill the people you love. Currently, the state does allow homeowners to do their own residential wiring; however, it is critical that the current electrical code is followed. Any time you or an electrician does wiring or other electrical work at your home or farm, Minnesota state law requires a state wiring inspector to conduct a proper inspection of the work. A rough-in inspection must be made before any wiring is covered. A final inspection is also required. For more information visit dli.mn.gov and go to the electrical page.

Anyone who plans to dig is required by law to notify the state of their intentions at least 48 hours in advance. All digging requires the 48hour notification so that buried telephone line, television cable, pipelines, utility electrical lines, municipal water and sewer lines can be located to ensure that none will be severed or damaged.

Make sure to water your tree daily to prevent any fire risk and to keep your tree in tip-top shape!




Check for broken or frayed cords before plugging in any decorations or lights in your home.

We are rebuilding three miles of single-phase line southwest of Grygla. On this rebuild, we will shorten the spans and reconductor with ACSR conductor. These power lines have had some significant damage due to frost and icing conditions in the past. It has been nice to see that we have been knocking out several service orders for right-of-way clearing. I'm going to try keep both mowers going most of the winter. In our construction season, it is very hard to have the manpower to take care of trees and maintenance. We try to capitalize on those issues this time of the year. Also, in the Grygla and Fourtown area, we contracted with a company to test our poles for rot, decay and other damage. Finally, I also have a crew hanging fiber on poles a few days of the week and that's going quite well. The weather so far has been just great!

RESPONSE

With mild winter predicted, demand response program prepared for system/market anomalies

n Minnesota, we can always appreciate a break from brutally cold and snowy winters. We might get that break this season – the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) is predicting above-average temperatures and below-average precipitation for our region.

However, the winter climate isn't the only consideration behind the deployment of your cooperative's demand response (off-peak) program. The power supply experts at Minnkota Power Cooperative (our wholesale power provider) will be monitoring several factors throughout the winter season, but they anticipate the standard 150-200 hours of demand response.

"What actually happens depends largely on weather, but also on system and market conditions," explained Dan Trebil, Minnkota's energy supply manager. "While the energy market has softened somewhat from the previous two years, we are still experiencing significant volatility. Any unusual system condi-

tions, generator outages, icing on wind farms, etc., can adversely affect this."

Trebil says that at this time his team is not expecting any conditions wildly out of the ordinary, especially given the baseload nature of Minnkota's coal-based plants. The Milton R. Young Station and Coyote Station have proven time and time again to be reliable sources of electricity for the cooperatives and communities served through the Minnkota-Northern Municipal Power Agency Joint System, and they are well prepared for the upcoming winter season. With that being said, unplanned outages can occur at any time - even with wind generation.

"In the winter, the wind farms can experience anything from icing to cold-temperature and/or high-wind shutdowns. These types of generator outages can lead to an increased need for demand response, especially if they occur during extreme weather conditions," Trebil said.

Minnkota works hard to keep any "control periods"

to less than 200 collective hours a season to lessen the impact on member-consumers, while also garnering the value that the demand response program provides to homes, the co-op itself, and the entirety of the electric grid. In cases where Minnkota's systemwide load exceeds its generation capabilities, they can implement the demand response program to avoid purchasing high-priced energy from the regional grid. This not only balances energy across the grid, but also saves the cooperatives money, which allows them to keep electric rates stable year to year.

If you are a demand response program participant, now is the time to make sure your home is prepared for the winter. Be sure that all backup heat sources are functioning and that any necessary fuel sources (such as fuel oil or propane) are refilled. Demand response can activate without much notice, even during somewhat mild weather in your area.

2024 DIRECTOR ELECTIONS

PETITION DEADLINE TUESDAY, FEB. 6, 2024

Roseau Electric Cooperative, Inc., is organized as a cooperative and is owned by its members. The membership elects a board of directors to represent them in the operation of the cooperative.

Three directors will be elected at the 2024 Annual Meeting scheduled for April 6 at the Roseau School Theater. The directors whose terms expire in 2024 are: Jim Hallan, District 1 (3-year term); Ed Walsh, District 6 (3-year term); and Mark Sax, District 9 (3-year term).

NOMINATION BY PETITION

No nominating committee will be used. All nominations will be done by petition, including the incumbents.

Any 10 or more members who reside in Districts 1, 6 or 9 may nominate an eligible member for a director position in that district. No member may be elected to a director position unless nominated in this manner. No write-in ballots shall be accepted.

PETITION FORMS ARE AVAILABLE

Director candidates must pick up a petition and a director packet at Roseau Electric Cooperative, Inc., in Roseau. The packet contains additional forms that must be signed and turned in before the deadline.



PETITION DEADLINE

The cooperative must receive the completed petition no later than the close of business at 4:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 6, 2024.

- · Review and approve a sound financial plan.

- · Establish special or standing committees.
- · Review responsibilities of board and manager.
- Approve the selection of consultants and attorney.
- Establish measures and controls to determine effectiveness of management.
- · Authorize and review annual financial audit.





Cold, blizzarding weather is just part of life here in the North - being prepared comes with the territory. As you and your family start assembling your winter weather emergency kits, here is a helpful checklist to make sure you have everything you need to keep everyone in your home safe.

WHAT TO INCLUDE IN AN EMERGENCY KIT:



Nonperishable foods

 Canned foods. crackers, protein bars



Extra warm clothing

· Hats, mittens, socks, scarves



Flashlights with extra batteries



One gallon of water per household member

5-day supply

Extra blankets



A first-aid kit

Prescription medications

5-day supply



Basic toiletries

 Toilet paper, facial tissues, diapers, wipes



Pet food

Battery-powered radio or TV



Full-charged portable chargers

If your power is ever out for an extended period of time, here are some helpful tips to keep your home and appliances safe:

- At night, cover windows and doors with sheets, blankets or extra towels.
- Allow a small drip from your faucets to prevent pipes from freezing.
- Take precautions and never operate a backup generator inside your home.
- Keep doors of unused rooms closed and place towels underneath to keep heat from escaping.
- Unplug major appliances and electronics to protect them from power surges.
