

Attendance and Engagement Strategy

Firstly whānau, I want to acknowledge the fact that most children's attendance is excellent and where it should be. I also acknowledge at this time there are some nasty bugs around and if your child is unwell, they need to be at home.

Overall attendance at schools in New Zealand has been declining since around 2015. One of the key initiatives from the Ministry of Education is to raise attendance rates across the board. Attendance is a complex issue and is more than just a child being absent from school, and the strategy is a multifaceted approach to address it. I have attached the attendance strategy below for your information.

The attendance targets outlined here are very achievable in our Dalefield

context however I will be working with families to support increased uptake where this is a concern.

Whilst our overall attendance figures (Term 1 this year) are at 90%, as a school I need to ensure that <u>all</u> students' attend regularly and the 90% target is reflected across <u>all</u> children. Our school's strategic goal under hauora refers directly to improved attendance being a result of this focus.

Thank you Daniel and other volunteers for turning up with a fire engine this afternoon. It was great to have this here after the firewire mahi yesterday in Waihakeke!






