Here's how to troubleshoot and potentially resolve the problem. Firstly, remove any connected devices, such as an external keyboard or monitor. This ensures that any peripherals aren't affecting your Chromebook's performance. If you're experiencing a black screen instead, connecting an external monitor might help with troubleshooting. Next, press Esc + Refresh + Power simultaneously to restart your device. These buttons are located on the top row of your keyboard. Hard restarting your Chromebook may require holding down specific buttons - consult your device's documentation for instructions.
