#### **OBJECTIVES**

- · Establish an understanding of the awareness, attitudes and perceptions of Forsyth County residents relating to Pre-K programs
- Identify key issues to be addressed in the Pre-K Priority communication plan
- Create a baseline measure of key metrics to be utilized in assessing the efficacy of the communication plan

#### **KEY INSIGHTS**


- Early childhood education is an important issue among Forsyth County voters across every age, income bracket, gender, race, and political opinion.
- A majority of voters believe we should be doing more to support quality Pre-K.
- People are more likely to believe near-term beneficial outcomes than longer term.
- People are more likely to associate safety and comfort than academic standards as components of quality Pre-K.
- Most people are not aware of current Pre-K initiatives occurring in North Carolina or other states.
- There is an expectation that funds for expanded Pre-K would come from multiple sources, including local and state government.





#### **OUR SAMPLE**

- Online survey; poor responses discarded
- 511 fully completed
- Narrowed 511 to smaller subset of registered voters using random selection to more closely model the population of Forsyth County by Income, Age, and Race (white, black, & Hispanic)
- n = 380, 95% confidence level, 5% margin of error


Unless otherwise stated, percentages reflect proportion of respondents who rated a prompt as 5 or 6 on a six-point scale.


#### IMPORTANCE OF EARLY EDUCATION

Among a list of general issues, education issues were ranked the highest in importance.

Improving the quality of public education	89%
Making sure that our children get a strong start through quality early childhood education	84%
Increasing the number of good paying jobs available to all	84%
Controlling the cost of all forms of health care	81%
Reducing the tax burden on families	80%
Making sure our natural environment is healthy and protected	70%
Reducing the tax burden on businesses and employers	44%

When it comes to ensuring children begin kindergarten with the knowledge and skills they need to do their best in school, do you think we should be doing more, doing less, or are we doing enough?



## A STRONG MAJORITY OF RESPONDENTS BELIEVE WE NEED TO MAKE EARLY EDUCATION A PRIORITY IN FORSYTH COUNTY.

81% say we owe it to our children to make preparing them for kindergarten a top priority.64% strongly support expanding access to quality Pre-K.57% think we should increase local funding for quality early education.


#### PERCEPTIONS OF PRE-K PROGRAM QUALIFICATIONS

When given a list of attributes necessary for a quality Pre-K program, people perceive academic qualifications as less important than those relating to safety and comfort.

Parents feel their child is in a safe environment	90%
A comfortable, positive learning environment	89%
Parent involvement is strongly encouraged	85%
Children receive healthy snacks and meals	81%
How important is it that Pre-K teachers have specialized training in early childhood education?	77%
Parents are provided with information about other types of help offered in the community	75%
Children receive health screenings in dental, vision, and hearing	71%
Uses a proven, approved course of study	70%
Meets government standards	68%
One teacher for every 10 children	66%
Teachers have at least 4-year college degree	61%

#### PEOPLE BELIEVE PARTICIPATION WOULD BE GOOD






#### **EXPECTED FUNDING FOR PRE-K PROGRAMS**

People vary in their opinions on how we should fund Pre-K. Approximately half of voters think some of the funding should come from local sources (city and county governments).






### **ACTIONS OF SUPPORT**
