




The upcoming 10th edition of the Massachusetts Building Code, known as 780 CMR, is set to introduce significant updates. These include provisions for the construction of tall mass timber structures, specific allowances for laboratory suites, the incorporation of energy storage systems, and the requirement for integrated testing of fire protection and life safety systems.



These modifications align with the 2021 International Building Code and the 2019 NFPA 72, alongside specific amendments tailored for Massachusetts. The Healey Administration sanctioned the draft of the 10th edition on December 11, 2023, paving the way for public consultations. The schedule for these sessions is as follows: an in-person meeting on February 14, 2024, at the Reggie Lewis Track and Athletic Center in Boston; a virtual meeting on February 21, 2024; and another in-person meeting on February 28, 2024, at the Springfield Technical Community College. These forums will allow for oral and written input from stakeholders. Comments can also be directed to the Board of Building Regulations and Standards via email or post, with a deadline set for March 6, 2024. Subsequent BBRs meetings are planned for March 12, April 9, and May 14. While the exact date for the formal adoption of the 10th edition is not confirmed, it is expected that the Board's vote will likely take place in April, with official promulgation by the Secretary of State anticipated in late spring or early summer. For those interested in the specifics of the 'Massachusetts Building Code 10th Edition,' these updates reflect a commitment to modernizing building practices and enhancing safety measures. The public hearings and comment period offer a transparent process for the adoption of these regulations. The tentative hearing dates for the 10th edition are set for February 14 and 28 in person, with the location to be determined, and a virtual session on February 21. Summary of Key Changes					
Below is a summary of key changes between the current 8 <sup>th</sup> and proposed 9 <sup>th</sup> editions. The 8 <sup>th</sup> edition used the 2009 model codes and the 9 <sup>th</sup> edition will use the 2015 model codes. The model codes are a family of code books updated and published every three years by the International Code Council used across the country of which the International Building Code (IBC) and International Residential Code (IRC) are the primary volumes. These changes are due to:

The I-Code definition of fire area has been adopted by the BBRS for the 9 <sup>th</sup> edition which will allow building owners and designers to separate uses of a building (subdivide) with fire walls, fire barriers and horizontal assemblies thus enhancing design flexibility and likely reducing costs. The 8 <sup>th</sup> edition (MA unique) definition copied here: FIRE AREA. <i>The aggregate area of a building regardless of subdivisions by fire barriers and horizontal assemblies mimicked the sprinkler law (MGL c. 148 §26G), which precludes subdivision. Reference to 26G is retained to alert the code user that sprinkler requirements are in both the model code and general laws.</i>
