Jurassic Park Franchise Overview The Jurassic Park franchise is a multimedia series centered around the concept of creating a theme park featuring cloned dinosaurs. The story began in 1990 when Universal Studios acquired the rights to Michael Crichton's novel, which was already successful and led to a 1993 film adaptation that spawned five sequels. Video game developers Ocean Software, BlueSky Software, and Sega of America have handled video game development since the 1993 film. The franchise has undergone significant changes over time, with various companies bidding on the rights to develop games and produce content. Original Concept Michael Crichton initially conceived a screenplay centered around cloning a pterodactyl from fossil DNA. He later developed Jurassic Park, which was influenced by his discussion with Steven Spielberg about a screenplay for the TV series ER. Acquisition and Production Universal Studios acquired the rights to the novel in May 1990 for \$1.5 million plus a percentage of the gross revenue. The company invested heavily in promoting the film, which became a critical and commercial success. Sequels and Spin-Offs Following the release of Jurassic Park on home video, Crichton was pressured into writing a sequel novel. However, he declined all offers until Spielberg expressed interest in directing the sequel. The Lost World: Jurassic Park was released in 1997, followed by Jurassic Park III in 2001. Development Changes Jurassic Park III was initially titled "Jurassic Park: Extinction" but was later renamed to avoid suggesting a definitive ending. The film's story evolved significantly over time, with new writers contributing to the script. The final product featured Pteranodons escaping from Site B and causing chaos on the mainland. While the team prepared for the film, sets, costumes, and props were built, only to have the script thrown out five weeks before filming began to pursue a new "rescue mission" plot. During pre-production, concept artists created promotional materials using working titles like Jurassic Park: Extinction and Jurassic Park: Breakout. Despite not being based on a Michael Crichton novel, the film contained minor scenes from his books, including the Pteranodon aviary and boat usage. In a departure from previous films, Spinosaurus replaced T. rex as the main antagonist due to its unique silhouette. The special effects combined animatronics and CGI, with some dinosaurs featuring new portrayals based on recent paleontological discoveries. For instance, Velociraptors had quill-like structures on their heads and necks, reflecting evidence of feathered raptors. Jurassic World was initially discussed after the release of its predecessor, with Spielberg planning to produce it and Johnson set to direct. Screenwriter Monahan was hired in November 2002, and by July 2003, he completed the first draft, which no longer took place in a jungle setting. The story may have involved dinosaurs going to the mainland. Sam Neil expressed interest in returning as Dr. Alan Grant, with filming locations including Hawaii and California. In September 2004, screenwriter Sayles re-wrote the script, aiming for a winter 2005 release. Jurassic World film development history has been marked by several delays and changes in direction. Initially planned for release in 2008, filming began in 2007 but was delayed until 2009 due to production issues. In 2013, Colin Trevorrow was announced as the director of the fourth installment, with a release date set for June 13, 2014. However, the film's release was pushed back to 2015, and it eventually became Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom. During early discussions for the 2015 film, executive producer Steven Spielberg expressed interest in creating multiple films within the series. Trevorrow aimed to create a more cohesive story arc, potentially leading to a series of connected films. The sequel's plot was initially discussed as exploring dinosaurs going open source, allowing various entities around the world to create their own cloned species. In 2024, it was announced that David Koepp is working on the next installment, Jurassic World: Rebirth. The making of the first Jurassic Park film began before Michael Crichton's novel was published, with Spielberg hiring Stan Winston Studios and Industrial Light and Magic to create cutting-edge special effects. The film received positive reviews from critics, despite some criticism of character development. It went on to gross over \$914 million, becoming the highest-grossing film at the time. This success led to a new wave of films that heavily utilized computer-generated imagery (CGI) for special effects. The Lost World: Jurassic Park was released in 1997, directed by Steven Spielberg and based on Crichton's novel of the same name. After the success of the first film, fans and critics pressured Crichton to write a sequel. The book was published, followed by a film in pre-production with a target release date of mid-1997. The film was a commercial success but received mixed reviews from critics. Jurassic Park III was released in 2001, directed by Joe Johnston and not based on a Michael Crichton novel or directed by Steven Spielberg. Originally titled Jurassic Park: Extinction, the script involved a deadly disease threatening to wipe out the dinosaurs. The idea was later reused for Jurassic Park IV. The film received mixed reviews from critics, with some considering it better than its predecessor. Jurassic World is a 2015 science fiction film and sequel to Jurassic Park III. It is not based on a Michael Crichton novel. Jurassic films series has had a huge success with the third film not being directed by Steven Spielberg or based on a Michael Crichton book. The first sequel, Jurassic World, was about a new theme park where a genetic hybrid escapes and wreaks havoc. The story also featured Alan Grant, Ellie Sattler, and Ian Malcolm reuniting to take down Biosyn. Short films like Battle at Big Rock followed the events after Fallen Kingdom, with dinosaurs existing in the wider world alongside humans. The story centered around a family's fight for survival against wild animals. The Prologue showed a prehistoric segment depicting various dinosaurs before skipping 65 million years later to present day, where Rexy was roaming free in the US soil. TV shows like Jurassic World: Camp Cretaceous and Chaos Theory were part of the franchise. The logo, dubbed Logosaurus, was featured on the majority of the films' logos, with a Tyrannosaurus rex being the most iconic. Games inspired by the movies included LEGO Jurassic World and Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom. Jurassic World and Jurassic Park are two popular franchises that have spawned numerous movies, comics, video games, and other media. The series follows the adventures of humans and dinosaurs in a world where the prehistoric creatures have been brought back to life through genetic engineering. From Jurassic World: Alive to Jurassic World Dominion, and from Jurassic Park to Jurassic Park: Redemption, the franchise has explored various themes such as evolution, survival, and humanity's relationship with nature.
