Chucky, Tiffany, and their spawn sneak into a limousine driven by Jennifer, who's trying to land a role in rapper Redman's film. The trio, having witnessed Glen/Glenda's parents' murder, start questioning their killing sprees, with Tiffany attempting to reign in Chucky's bloodlust for the sake of their child. Meanwhile, Jennifer tries to seduce Redman to get the Virgin Mary role, but her assistant is disgusted by her intentions. However, the truth comes out when Redman fires her from his film due to his misogynistic views. In a fit of rage, Tiffany guts Redman, and Jennifer gives birth to twins. Chucky takes advantage of the chaos and decides he no longer wants to become human, leading to a falling-out with Tiffany. After a series of violent events, including the death of Stan and the police arriving, Jennifer is rushed to the hospital. Later on, it's revealed that Glen and Glenda have transferred their souls into Jennifer's two children. Billy Boyd voiced Glen / Glenda, a complex character dealing with gender identity issues in the cult classic-inspired film Son of Chucky. Redman starred as himself, while Hannah Spearritt played Joan. The movie also featured John Waters as Pete Peters and Steve Lawton as Stan among others. After the success of Bride of Chucky, production on Son of Chucky began on October 18, 1998. Don Mancini wrote a screenplay inspired by Glen or Glenda, exploring LGBT themes and shifting the series towards comedy. Universal Pictures initially rejected the script due to its unconventional approach but Focus Features approved it after Cabin Fever's success in 2003. Seed of Chucky was filmed primarily in Romania to save costs, with Tony Gardner handling the animatronic and makeup effects. The film opened at #4 on November 11-14, 2004, grossing \$8,774,520 and ultimately earning a domestic total of \$17,083,732 and worldwide total of \$24,829,644. The film "Seed of Chucky" was released by Momentum Pictures in July 2021 and received mixed reviews from critics. On Rotten Tomatoes, it holds a 37% approval rating, while on Metacritic, it has an average score of 46/100, indicating "mixed to average reviews". Audiences polled by CinemaScore gave the film an average grade of "C+". Roger Ebert praised the film's ability to balance two contrasting moods, stating that it's "actually two movies" - one wretched and the other funny. The film has been described as a "campy cult classic" by Out magazine in 2023. Despite mixed reviews, the film won several awards and nominations, including Best Actress for Jennifer Tilly at the Fangoria Chainsaw Awards. It also received nominations for Best Score, Best Frightened Performance, and Best Film at the Sitges - Catalan International Film Festival. The success of "Seed of Chucky" led to the creation of its sequels, "Curse of Chucky" in 2013, "Cult of Chucky" in 2017, and the TV series "Chucky" in 2021. Seed of Chucky, released in 2004, is the fifth installment in the Child's Play series. Directed by Don Mancini and written by him as well, the film marks his directorial debut. The movie stars Jennifer Tilly, Redman, Hannah Spearritt, John Waters, Billy Boyd, and Brad Dourif. The story follows Glen/Glenda, the child of Chucky and Tiffany, who resurrects their parents six years after Bride of Chucky. This revival causes chaos, showcasing the evolution of the series from horror to a hybrid horror-comedy. Filmed in Romania, Seed of Chucky was the last film from the original continuity to be theatrically released before moving to direct-to-video until the 2019 remake. The movie's production budget was \$12 million, grossing over \$24 million worldwide. The film follows Shitface, a doll being held captive by an abusive ventriloquist named Psych. Despite his peaceful nature, Shitface has violent nightmares about murder. When he sees a preview of Jennifer Tilly's new film Chucky Goes Psycho, he escapes and tracks down the original Chucky and Tiffany dolls. Using a voodoo amulet, Glen/Glenda resurrects their parents, causing confusion over their child's ambiguous gender. Chucky renames him "Glen," while Tiffany names him "Glenda." The movie concludes with Chucky and Tiffany decapitating a person, solidifying the series' evolution into horror-comedy. Mixed reviews from critics accompanied Seed of Chucky, which was followed by another sequel, Curse of Chucky, in 2013. Jennifer finds the beheaded corpse of a technician after Chucky, Tiffany, and their accomplice, Glen/Glenda, escape in Jennifer's limousine. Glen/Glenda asks why they killed the technician, catching them off guard. Meanwhile, Jennifer tries to seduce rapper Redman for a film role by inviting him home. Unbeknownst to her, Chucky and Tiffany plot to transfer their souls into Redman and Jennifer through demonic voodoo rituals. Tiffany's plan unfolds as she knocks out Redman and uses a turkey baster to inseminate Jennifer with Chucky's semen. Glen/Glenda accompanies Chucky on a joyride to kill a paparazzo who has been following Jennifer, resulting in the paparazzo's death by sulfuric acid. Jennifer awakens to find herself pregnant but attributes it to Redman, who she believes had not undergone a vasectomy. Upon discovering her true condition, Tiffany becomes enraged and kills Redman for his misogyny. As chaos ensues, Chucky decides he no longer desires humanity and instead accepts being a living doll. The twins are born, and both Glen and Glenda inhabit their bodies, but it's revealed that Tiffany's soul has successfully transferred into Jennifer's body. In the aftermath, Glen dismembers Chucky with an axe, realizing what he had done and breaking down in tears. Five years later, Jennifer raises her twins as if they were her own, with a nanny quitting due to fear of Glenda. However, during a birthday party, it's revealed that Tiffany has taken over Jennifer's body. The climax sees Glen face his dark doppelganger as Chucky's severed arm attacks him. The voice cast of Seed of Chucky included Jennifer Tilly as herself and Tiffany, Billy Boyd as Glen/ Glenda, Redman as himself, Hannah Spearritt as Joan, John Waters as Pete Peters, Keith-Lee Castle as Psych, Steve Lawton as Stan, Tony Gardner as himself, Jason Fienyng as Santa, Nicholas Rowe as Lawyer, Stephanie Chambers as Claudia's mum, Simon James Morgan as Claudia, Betty Simons-Denville as Claudia, Rebecca Santos as Fulvia Beans, El-Balawi as Human Glen, Kristina Hewitt as Human Glenda, Daniel Getzoff as Assistant Director, Nicola Mycroft as Reporter, Guy J. Louthan as Don Mancini, Diana Munteanu as Fan, Anouk Diks as Interviewer, Barnaby Thompson as Laughing Puppeteer, Eliot Mathews as Cop #1, Adi Handac as Cop #2, Paul Grossman as Little Boy, Nadia Dina Arigat as Britney. The film "Seed of Chucky" has received mixed reviews from critics and audiences alike. Released in 2004, it was distributed by Momentum Pictures in the UK. On Rotten Tomatoes, the film holds a 37% approval rating based on 78 reviews, with some praising its absurdity and others finding it unfunny or unentertaining. The critical consensus reads that while "Seed of Chucky" attempts to acknowledge the increasing absurdity of the franchise, it ultimately fails to deliver. On Metacritic, it has an average score of 46/100, indicating mixed to average reviews. Audiences have given the film a mediocre grade of "C+" on an A+ to F scale.
